From August 14th through the 19th, the city of Spokane, Washington was the venue for SDC's 41st Annual International Meet hosted by the Inland Northwest Chapter. The Red Lion at the Park was the meet hotel and its proximity to Spokane's beautiful Riverfront Park and downtown area was very convenient for everyone attending especially for those who didn't have a Studebaker or brand x to drive.

The meet began Monday with vendors set up to sell their wares and SDC officers and the Board meeting to transact the business of the club and elect officers. Chapter member Richard Dormois was elected Vice-President for 2005-2006 and Ed Reynolds was elected president. Continuing as secretary is Chapter member Jan Lockmon and as treasurer, Brian Millette. Highlights of the board meeting were presented by Colin Fort at the Wednesday general membership meeting which proceeded the auction. This year's auction benefited the newly formed SDC Foundation and with Richard Dormois serving as the auctioneer the auction raised over \$10,000 for the Foundation.

The results of the concours judging were announced at Friday evening's banquet which came after a performance of the Studebaker Band conducted by Glen Shull. Three Chapter members performed in this year's band - Deanna Manley, Larry Vahe and Larry Swanson. Several Arizona SDC members received awards at the banquet in the Concours judging. Earning seconds in the C & K Class were Sid Rosen and Larry Vahe, both with Speedsters. In the Custom-Studebaker Powered Class, Richard Dormois received a first with his fresh-out-of-the shop 1938 Coupe Express. Tom and Elaine Horne of Prescott earned a first in the Custom-Non Studebaker Powered Class with a 1933 Rockne street rod. Congratulations to all and thank you for displaying some of SDCs finest examples of the marquee we all love and enjoy.

Of course, there was much more happening throughout the week including tours to many parts of Washington and Idaho, other event functions such as the ice cream social at the Welcome Night party, Fun Night Thursday evening and the Antique Studebaker Club's auction. The week culminated with a tour on Saturday that included a visit to the shop that prepared Richard's Coupe Express and a look around the garage at George Gezelius' Colville home. It was a great meet and one to be remembered as among the best. Next year, we'll be off to Omaha for the 42nd International Meet in September. Hope to see you there.

RAYMOND LOEWY: DESIGNS FOR A CONSUMER CULTURE NOW OPENS NOVEMBER 3, 2005"

Dear AOAI members:

After the current Issue #131 of Avanti Magazine went to press, we learned that the scheduled Sept. 15 opening of the Raymond Loewy design exhibit is postponed until Nov. 3 at the Museum of Design in Atlanta.

Normally, we do not send mass e-mail messages to our AOAI members, but we wanted to alert anyone that might have been planning to attend the museum exhibit opening next month.

I am copying the revised press release below from the Museum of Design Atlanta. For those that will not be able to attend the exhibit opening in November, we'll have complete coverage in the next issue of Avanti Magazine.

(ATLANTA, GA) In light of the success of Graphic Noise, MODA (Museum of Design Atlanta) announced today that the exhibition would be held over through October 22, 2005. That means postponing the opening of another great exhibition, Raymond Loewy: Designs for a Consumer Culture until November 3, 2005. The exhibition will continue through December 23, 2005.

MODA hopes to capitalize upon the media attention and buzz surrounding the arts that November is sure to bring to Atlanta with the opening of the High Museum expansion. The unveiling of the Georgia Aquarium in late November will also spotlight downtown Atlanta—the home of MODA. "The Raymond Loewy exhibition warrants a strategic opening date, and that, combined with the overwhelming success of Graphic Noise, made this an easy decision," says Kimberly Wolfe, MODA Interim Executive Director.

Raymond Loewy was the most prominent industrial designer of the 20th century. A pioneer of that profession, he crafted a signature style by blending the traditional with streamlining and European modernism. His firms created everything from lipsticks to locomotives as Loewy himself said. Raymond Loewy: Designs for a Consumer Culture, opening September 15 at Museum of Design Atlanta (MODA), showcases the work of Loewy and his talented associates, placing it in the wider context of design's role in shaping a new, modern look for the consumer society of the last century. A fascinating array of original drawings, models, products, advertisements, photographs, archival documents, and rare footage of Loewy at work over five decades, brings to life the career of the prolific and influential figure who did much to define the culture of consumption.

Raymond Loewy was born in France in 1893 and immigrated to the United States in 1919. After a successful career in commercial illustration, he turned to the new field of industrial design in the late 1920s. The streamlined look that his work personified combined beauty, function, and simplification to dominate design from the 1930s into the 1950s. Loewy then led the way in spreading the American approach to industrial design abroad. His success and showmanship made him the best known industrial designer in the world and earned him a place on the cover of Time Magazine in 1949.

Loewy's redesign of the 1935 Coldspot © refrigerator for Sears, Roebuck, and Co. sent the company's refrigerator sales skyrocketing. He and his firm worked for the Pennsylvania Railroad and other railroads for more than 20 years. For two decades he was the principal designer for Studebaker, shaping several classic cars including the 1963 Avanti ©. Numerous airlines and cruise ship lines adopted Loewy interiors from the 1930s into the 1960s.

In the 1950s Loewy's designers created many of the postwar era's products, including appliances such as Frigidaire ranges and the Super Chef © broiler-rotisserie for Broil-Quik, kitchenware, and countless packages for food and beverages. At the same time, Loewy crafted several acclaimed lines of china for the German-based firm Rosenthal, in production for more than 20 years.

Loewy spent more than five decades streamlining and modernizing everything from silverware to fountain pens to supermarkets and department stores. He and his teams designed the logo and color scheme of Air Force One and the John F. Kennedy memorial stamp, the Greyhound Scenicruiser ©, and the interiors for NASA's Skylab. His clients included such American icons as Coca-Cola, Exxon, and Lucky Strike cigarettes. Many of his designs, though occasionally modified, are still in use today.

Raymond Loewy: Designs for a Consumer Culture, made possible by a generous grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, is curated by Glenn Porter, Director Emeritus, Lynn Cantanese, Head of Manuscripts and Archives, and Jim Hinz, former Library Conservator, all of the Hagley Museum and Library in Wilmington, Delaware. The exhibition is organized by the Hagley Museum and Library and toured by Exhibits USA. The purpose of Exhibits USA is to create access to an array of diverse art forms and cultures, and encourage the expanding depth and breadth of cultural life in local communities.

Exhibits USA is generously supported by the Adair Margo Gallery Inc.; Altria Group Inc.; James H. Additional objects supplement the exhibit in Atlanta courtesy of Laurence Loewy, the daughter of Raymond Loewy, and resident of Marietta, Georgia. Laurence continues to honor the legacy of her father by promoting Loewy exhibits and collections around the world.

STUDEBAKERS AND BOBBI-KAR AUTOMOBILES BY SCOTT GRAINGER

One of the tasks, it seems, that the oldest child has in the family is to help the parents sort through the things that they have saved over the years when one parent passes on and the other decides to downsize their responsibilities. This adventure can take some very interesting and curious turns.

In my case, for instance, I have had the joy of seeing old photographs and letters and reacquainting my self with places that we lived and people that I had met many years ago. Among the letters was a transfer document for a 1954 Studebaker Champion Model 15G to my father after his father died.

The transfer document was prepared by the executor of the estate, my father's brother. This is the car that Barbara and I owned when we were married. The documents provide enough detail that I think I can now trace the whereabouts of the car. The transfer document was typed on letter head stationary for "Grainger's Bobbi-Kar Company", Billings, Montana. Prior to this I was not aware that my uncle had been involved in automobiles I always knew him as a retired Northern Pacific Railroader and used household goods re-saler. By the time the transfer document was written, 1960, the Bobbi-Kar company had been out of business for about 10 years.

One of the persons that helped start the Bobbi-Kar outfit was an old Studebaker person, George Keller who, when he left Studebaker, was VP of Sales. He left due to a clash with Ken Elliot, Manager of Studebaker. Keller gave Bobbi-Kar a good go but the thing ended up in bankruptcy anyway.

You just never know what you may find in your family tree.

AN OPEN LETTER TO MEMBERSHIP REGARDING THE STUDEBAKER MUSEUM FROM REBECCA BONHAM

Dear Members and Friends.

It's been a long journey. But we're coming down to the last mile. And, like any worthwhile journey, the sense of excitement and anticipation are (sic) building

I'm talking, of course, about the new Studebaker National Museum scheduled to open this fall at the corner of Chapin and Thomas Streets in the West Washington Historic District adjacent to the Northern Indiana Center for History. It's going to be a facility we'll all be proud of.

Construction is moving along at a lively rate and right on schedule. The building exterior is nearly complete and one is able to see how nicely the colors work with the exterior of the Center for History. The interior is taking shape as well. The Bullet Nose Gallery - the glassed wall area facing Chapin Street - will be spectacular! Similarly exciting will be the majestic staircase that includes a landing from which to observe an authentic "body drop", reminiscent of actual Studebaker production.

Hydraulic lifts in the Lower Level will cleverly hold vehicles in "double-decker" fashion, visible to the public Our staff and the professional museum design and fabrication firms have developed dazzling yet functional exhibits and interpretive pavilions. The interactive exhibits are both fun and functional, especially the "Build Your Own Car" kiosk!

The History in the Making Capital Campaign is also moving along on schedule. We continue to secure leader-ship gifts from the community and the campaign to the Studebaker Drivers Club is successful as well. We need a minimum of \$800,000 to reach our goal of \$2.9 million but we intend to work to exceed our goal to build the endowment. The public appeal will be launched soon. We hope to raise \$200,000 through brick sales, custom merchandise sales and special event revenue.

During the last three years, astounding accomplishments have been made moving us toward our goal to build a state-of-the-art museum facility that is environmentally controlled to suit the varied temperature and humidity needs of the priceless collection of vehicles, artifacts, archives and objects; and to provide programs and exhibits that inform, educate and entertain visitors of all ages about the industrial history of the South Bend-Mishawaka area.

Due to your generous financial support last year, the museum reached its goal of raising \$30,000 for the Annual Fund. We are grateful for your contributions as they allowed us to complete the inventory and catalog of the 70 tons of archival materials in our vast collection, a task that took two years to complete!

TECH TIP By LARRY CUSHING

September is here. Our Studebakers are mostly coming out of storage; unlike most of the U.S. where they (Studes) will be put to bed for winter.

If your car has been sitting all summer, before you fire it up it's a good idea to pull the plugs and squirt a little Marvel Mystery Oil in each cylinder. Do NOT use Quick Start Sprays for initial fire up as that tends to dry any oil film you may have in your cylinders. Crank the motor a couple of times to spread Mystery Oil around and build a bit of oil pressure to lube bearings.

Use a mixture of gas & 2 stroke oil or Mystery oil. 6-10 parts gas to 1 part oil is fine. Pour a little in carb throats, fire the engine. It may take a couple of tries to get gas pumped to the carb.

When running fill tank with fresh gas & a can/bottle of quality gas system cleaner. This should keep you running smoothly until you store it again.


