Studebaker in Print

The Transportation Book Service, a division of Iconografix has announced a new book in their series of transportation related books. Their newest book is Ab & Marvin Jenkins - The Studebaker Connection and the Mormon Meteors by Gordon Eliot White. The synopsis provided by the service says this about the book -

"Ab Jenkins drove for Studebaker in speedway and road races during the late 1920s and early '30s, then took a Pierce-Arrow roadster to Bonneville, Utah, for the first-ever timed run on the Salt Flats. His 112 mile-anhour record for 24 hours made him world-famous. Ab's son, Marvin was a racer in his own right, driving one of the Studebakers more thant 90 miles an hour in 1931. After the war Marvin was tapped to drive the famed Novi Indianapolis car at Bonneville, where he set Class D records in 1947. In Ab's final drive, he and Marvin teamed up in 1956 to drive a Pontiac to a 24 hour stock car record of more than 118 miles an hour."

Studebaker and Baby Formula

n addition to the Studebaker factory that built carriages and automobiles, Studebaker had a factory that made baby formula from 1901-'03 and of which J. M. Studebaker was president. The company was the American Malt Cream Company, listed as a manufacturer of High Grade Pharmaceutical Preparations and the Ideal Infant and Invalid Food, "American Malt Cream'.

According to an article the editor received from Mike Barany, the creation of the formula was instigated by the news of a South Bend woman giving birth to quadruplets in 1901. The husband was wrapped up in his inventions and the family was penniless. The mother's situation came to the attention of J. M. and the company produced the product that was fed to the infants from their birth in September, up to November 1 when it was noted they had exactly doubled in weight.

Little else is known of the American Malt Cream and Drug Company and your editor's brief efforts to research it further yielded nothing about this interesting bit of Studebaker history.

Present were Dennis Lynde, Deanna Manley, Chris Collins, Richard Dormois (on behalf of the IMC), Mike Barany and Larry Vahe. Only a couple of topics were discussed during the course of the three hour meeting. Your committee is still dealing with the issue of a venue. The following are contenders and if any club members know of a potential site please contact one of the committee members so your site can be considered. 1. Mesa Convention Center. Dennis, Richard and Larry had a tour of this facility and found it favorable to hosting a national meet. A number of details need to be addressed but overall we could make this a potential venue for the meet. 2. Sheraton Crescent at I-17 & Dunlap. This was discussed as a potential site and your committee will be touring this facility in the near future. 3. Plaza Hotel at Indian Bend and Scottsdale. Another possible site that will be reviewed/ toured by the committee. 4. Flagstaff. The next committee meeting will take place on Saturday, October 14th when the committee travels to Flagstaff to review the available options up there. While we have not been officially 'blessed' by the SDC Board to hold the meet we feel that this confirmation will be forthcoming and we'll be in a position to expend some preliminary funds next year. This being the case, Mike will explore opening our account next Spring.

With that the meeting was adjourned. If you have any desire to make any recommendations or attend these meetings please let us know.

Made In Mexico

Avanti Motors has moved its manufacturing facility to Mexico according to an article in the Summer/Fall 2006 issue of *Avanti Magazine*. Mike Kelly, the company chairman, said the building in Villa Rica, Georgia where Avantis had been built until recently, has been sold and Avantis are now being built in a new production facility in Cancun. 400 new Avantis are expected to be shipped for the 2007 model year which includes a coupe, convertible, the new Avanti SVR and the Avanti SUV. Only 150 of the vehicles built will be Avantis. The Avanti SUV is the model formerly known as the Studebaker SUV.

Mr. Kelly states the move to Cancun was made to get the manufacturing closer to his resort business, to utilize a more skilled labor force, cut the cost of labor and have less cost for general overhead and insurance.

Although 2006 Avanti models were being built through the summer nearly all have been spoken for. The 2007 models were to be available from dealers in mid-August.

The end of a long road

Corp.'s March 4, 1966 announcement that it would stop producing cars and shutter its last manufacturing facility in Hamilton, Ont. almost seemed anticlimatic.

Just 39 months earlier, the city of South Bend, Ind. had been shaken to its very foundation when Studebaker announced it would close its automotive operations in that city and consolidate all automotive operations in Hamilton, Ont. That move alone threw 7,000 employees out of work and deprived South Bend of an annual payroll of \$50 million.

By contrast, the decision to close Hamilton affected about 400 hourly-rated employees and 200 salaried workers. Studebaker's market share had fallen below 2 percent, making it a near nonentity. And more importantly, the demise of Studebaker had been anticipated for years.

It was no wonder that *Automotive News*, when listing the top automotive news stories of 1966, never mentioned the end of the Studebaker automobile.

Although corporate officials never admitted it, Studebaker essentially died when the

last U.S.-produced Studebaker rolled off the line Dec. 20, 1963. By moving to Canada, Studebaker eliminated its engineering and styling departments and produced only moderately updated vehicles. And automotive insiders knew the company simply could not go on indefinitely producing the same series of dated cars.

That was the not the public face Studebaker presented when the first shipment of Canadian-built Studebakers headed for the United States in 1964.

"We didn't come (to Canada) to die. We came to live," proclaimed Studebaker Chairman R.H. Guthrie.

The goal was to be able to have the automotive division make a profit by producing only 20,000 cars a year. It could do this through the more efficient Hamilton factory and the elimination of the money-draining South Bend factories.

But even this reduced goal proved to be an elusive target. For the 1964 model year, Studebaker produced 42,462 cars, of which 12,328 were produced in Hamilton. Of these, 6,428 were exported to the U.S.

For the 1965 model year, the automotive division once again missed the 20,00 break-even goal by manuf-

acturing 18,592 Studebakers, of which only 11,232 were exported to the U.S.

Clearly, 1966 was going to be Studebaker's do-or-die year. But as of March 1, the company's Hamilton factory had produced only 2,000 cars. Despite last minute brokering with Toyota and Isuzu and Canadian Motor Industries, the board of directors had no choice when it announced Hamilton operations would halt.

The last Studebakers were produced March 17, 1966, the final being a Turquoise Cruiser now on display at the Studebaker National Museum.

"While I sincerely regret the necessity of discontinuing Studebaker cars, the irreversible losses being occurred permit no other course," Studebaker President

Byers A. Burlingame said.

Studebaker's decision was big news in Detroit, whereThe Free Press mourned the loss of an American icon. The demise of Studebaker also was widely reported in the Canadian media, which sadly noted the loss of Canada's onlv independent automobile producer.

"Studebaker Corporation's decision to throw in the sponge as an automobile manufacturer dashes the high hopes which it, along with a great many Canadians, held when

the company moved its entire auto-making operation from South Bend, Indiana to Hamilton, Ontario in December 1963," wrote the Calgary *Albertan*. "The vision of an all Canadian car has turned out to be pretty ephemeral."

Considering the company lacked engineering and styling departments, the 1966 Studebakers looked surprisingly fresh. Design work had been handled by Marcks, Hazelquist, Powers Inc., a Detroit-based industrial design company.

The '66 sported single multi-beam headlights, a four-rectangle-panel grille with Hawk medallian, repostioned side moldings and the "Refreshaire" air system with vents above the rear taillights. Interiors were upgraded with wood trim and the dashboard was modified.

Safety features included padded dual sun visors, non-glare windshield wipers, dual master cylinder and front and rear seat belts. The '66s also featured much needed aluminized rustproofing.

Six-cylinder and V-8 models were the Commander sedan and two-door sedan; the Wagonaire, the Daytona two-door sedan and the Cruiser sedan.

S ix miles from the Canadian border just outside the town of Alexander, Maine is a Studebaker truck that stands guard over Lawrence Lord's well drilling business.

Recently, my wife, Corlean, and I were in Maine to attend our daughter Amy's graduation from the University of Maine. While out on a Sunday drive through the beautiful Maine countryside we spotted this Studie truck up a very large pole. We slammed on the brakes so we could take a couple of pictures of this wonderous sight.

After the trip was over, back in Arizona I called Mr. Lord about his truck stuck-on-a-stick. Contrary to my belief, he did not use the truck in the early years of his business. He said the truck was acquired about 15 years earlier for advertising purposes. Mr. Lord testified that the truck had admirably brought quite a bit of



attention to his business, even though he knows little about the truck, not even the year of its manufacture.

If you look close, the truck has an unusual characteristic. It is covered with amber lights that come on automatically when the sun goes down. If I had only known, we would have come back after dark. This Studie is definitely alive and doing well – on the job for Lawrence Lord and Sons Well Drilling Company 24 hours a day. How many Studebakers can make that claim?

Sales, however, languished, with only 2,045 cars produced in 1966 before Hamilton closed. Total production for the 1966 model year was only 8,947. Prior to the announcement, Studebaker had plans to spend about \$250,000 on a single rectangle grille, new side treatment and interior modifications for the 1967 Studebakers.

There was also an aborted plan to have Stude-baker become part of Canadian Motor Industries, the distributor in Canada of Toyota and Isuzu automobiles. The Toyota Toyopet and the Isuzu Bellett would have become Studebaker models.

In addition, industrial designer Brooks Stevens also came up with an 11th-hour Studebaker design that would have used interchangeable front and rear doors and transverse-mounted engine. All of these plans were too late.

So the Studebaker died. In the end, the company that had been the ultimate American success story, became and American failure with its largely ignored Canadian car.

The Free Press of Nanaimo, B.C. lamented the

fact Studebakers would slowly fade from the highways, but boldly predicted the Studebaker name would live on.

"Years from now, the 'Studie' will be found among the collector's items. It will be polished and gleaming and it will bring back memories to many young people of today. Like a popular ship lost at sea, the memory of Studebaker will go on and on."



Cooking on the Road

Here's a great recipe for cooking on the engine of your Studebaker as you motor to Omaha this month for the International SDC Meet. This was Dwight Eisenhower's favorite food.

Ike's Pepper Steak

Distance: Approximately 55 miles 4 tablespoons whole peppercorns 1 small strip steak, ½ - ¾lb

At home or on the road. crush the peppercorns with a mallet, rolling pin, tire iron or jack handle, then spread them over both sides of the steak, pressing them in with your fingers to make them stick. Wrap in double thickness foil and place on manifold. Cook about 1/2 hour per side while driving through Kansas longer, if not directly in engine hot spot or shorter if you like 'em rare.




