President's Message

C aturday, March 24 was quite a day as about 60 Studebakers wended their way to the All-Arizona Gathering, also known as March Madness, at the Commemorative Air Force located in Mesa at Falcon Field. The gates were thrown open early and the cars displayed in front of the main hanger by 10AM. This is the space that the Studebaker powered B17 usually occupies but it left earlier in the day and flew to Luke AFB for their 'Luke Celebration Days'. My day, however, started some three hours earlier. It was 47 degrees and raining when I left my house nestled on the edge of the Prescott National Forest. The rain was dripping down from the pines and the thick forest floor was unusually pungent with the rich smells of the pine needles and pine cones. Between the highway and the gray rock strewn alluvial fans of the McDowell's, the Saguaros reached up their arms to the clouds surrounded by Desert Broom, Lavender, Hack and Wolfberry. The meet itself wasn't bad either! It was a pleasant 67 degrees and the air scented by the orange blossoms from the orchard across Greenfield Road. In no time we had four 'easy-ups' (how those tents got that name I'll never know) assembled and were soon passing out the colorful dash plaques. The turn out, as mentioned, was great and we had a wide variety of cars on display, from 1902 on up to the newer Avantis. 20th CENTURY AUTOMOBILE DESIGN EXHIBIT

The Phoenix Art Museum presents a first-of-its-kind 20th century automobile design exhibition April 1 through June 3. Entitled "Curves of Steel: Streamlined Automobile Design", the exhibit features many one of a kind cars. Twenty-two of the most streamlined cars are included in the exhibition including a Stout Scarab, an Auburn, a Talbot-Lago coupe, Chrysler Imperial Airflow, Delahaye and more. The years range from 1934 to 1994 and represent European and domestic vehicles.

The exhibit features cars from collectors from all over North America and it was organized by the Museum and an advisory group composed of a design historian, the former director of the Peterson Automobile Museum and one of the finest auto-mobile photographers among others.

The exhibit can be viewed during regular museum hours of 11:30 am-5:00 pm Wednesday through Sunday and 11:30 am-9:00 pm Tuesday. Admission to the automobile exhibit is \$14.00 adults, \$6.00 children ages 6-17, free for Museum members and children under age 6. Implementation of Emission Exemption a Month Away

The Arizona Vehicle Emissions Inspection Program for Collectible Vehicle & Motorcycle Exemption was published in the Federal Register March 30, 2007. [Federal Register: March 30, 2007 (Volume 72, Number 61)] [Rules and Regulations] [Page 15046-15049] From the Federal Register Online via GPO Access [wais.access.gpo.gov] [DOCID:fr30mr07-7]

SUMMARY: EPA is approving two revisions to the Arizona State Implementation Plan submitted by the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality. These revisions consist of: changes to Arizona's Basic and Enhanced Vehicle Emissions Inspection Programs to exempt collectible vehicles in the Phoenix metropolitan area, and collectible vehicles and motorcycles in the Tucson metropolitan area, from emissions testing requirements; an updated performance standard evaluation for the vehicle emissions inspection program in the Phoenix area; and new contingency measures.

The EPA is approving these two state implementation plan revisions because they meet all applicable requirements of the Clean Air Act and EPA's regulations and because the exemptions will not interfere with attainment or maintenance of the national ambient air quality standards in the two affected areas. EPA is finalizing this action under the Clean Air Act obligation to take action on State submittals of revisions to state implementation plans. The intended effect is to exempt these vehicle categories from the emissions testing requirements of the State's vehicle emissions inspection programs as approved for the Phoenix and Tucson areas but also to provide a mechanism to reinstate the requirements in the event of a violation of the carbon monoxide national ambient air quality standard in the Phoenix or Tucson area.

This rule is effective on April 30, 2007.

Going, going ...

L ike sands through the egg timer, the clock was seriously running out on Studebaker in 1964. That didn't stop the company from coming up with a proposed new model, a flat-front compact pickup that would have squabbled for sales with the



Ford Econoline, most prominently. Everybody assumed it had long since been junked.

Wrong-O, we're happy to report. Most Studebaker prototypes ended up being destroyed, as was often the case at the competing Big Three. The 1964 Truck Prototype was assumed to have suffered the same fate until it unexpectedly turned up in a barn at a family farm in Muskegon, Michigan. The prototype has since been restored and is in the collection of the Studebaker National Museum in South Bend, Indiana.

This was the final Studebaker designed and built in South Bend by styling chief Randy Faurot before production was consolidated in Ontario during Studebaker's final months. The pickup is similar to the ZIP vans that Studebaker built in great numbers for the U.S. Postal Service. The museum has recently relocated to a new climate-controlled building at 201 S. Chapin St. in South Bend.

Current Pending Federal Legislation

U.S. Car Hobby Needs To Support **S.587** "Model T Ford Automobile Commemorative Coin Act"

U.S. Senate Bill 587, or the "Model T Ford Automobile Commemorative Coin Act" is currently being considered by the U.S. Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs. *(As of 3-23-07.)* S.587 is being sponsored by Michigan Senators Debbie Stabenow and Carl Levin to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Ford Model T in 2008.

If this proposed bill is passed, the U.S. Treasury will issue a 1.5-inch, one ounce (26.73 gram) silver coin worth \$10.00 that will be "emblematic of the Model T Ford and the assembly line." They'll be legal U.S. tender and sold at its \$10.00 face value plus a small surcharge collected by coin dealers. These surcharges won't be enriching our national coffers, but rather our national automobile heritage. S.587 states that "the first \$5,000,000 of the surcharges received by the Secretary from the sale of coins ... shall be paid by the Secretary... up to half to the

Automobile National Heritage Area Partnership Inc., for creating an endowment for supporting the celebration and preservation of the Model T story; and maintaining and expanding national Model T educational programs."

The other half of the surcharges collected will go to "the Edison Institute, otherwise known as 'The Henry Ford,' in Dearborn, Michigan, a National Historic Landmark, for creating an endowment for maintaining and expanding displays and developing educational programs associated with the Model T Ford Automobile."

You can help show your support for our beloved collectible vehicle hobby and its significant impact on our nation's economy and culture by contacting your U.S. Senators to let them know that you and your vehicle clubs support S.587.

Help America celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Model T Ford, the first vehicle to make motorcars affordable and accessible to the masses. The 1908 to 1927 Ford Model T became the best selling and most popular car in the world for years and years and was not surpassed in total sales until a half century later when it was eclipsed by the VW Beetle. The Model T literally put America on wheels.

The Ford Model T, through its concept, inception and evolution, influenced and developed our modern mass production techniques which made America the great industrial and automotive leader of the last century.

So please, let your U.S. Senator know that you and your club support S.587. If the Model T coin can become a popular reality, who knows what other American automotive and motorcycle icons could become U.S. coins. Just imagine, cool cars on cold cash. This could be the start of an American car-coin renaissance.

Remember, it's united we drive, and, if we're divided or apathetic, our American vehicle hobby will be relegated to the dustbin of history as unsafe gross polluters. Icons or scapegoats, the choice is ours, and actions speak louder than intentions. So please contact your U.S. Senator in support of S.587. It won't take much of your time, and the good deed you do today for our vehicle hobby will last many lifetimes if S.587 passes into law. And, you can take that to the bank.

Traveling in Europe and Beyond with George Gezelius By Bea, Inland Northwest Chapter

• eorge Gezelius knows how to talk cars - because Uthat's what he did teaching Automobile Mechanics for his career. He got the teaching gene from his mom, a school teacher in Kettle Falls, Wash. She would chop wood in the morning to keep the kids warm, before she taught them to read. George got his technical bent from his dad, a dam engineer (no "n" on that!) who got recognition for engineering 20 million cubic yards of concrete in dams all over the west, including Grand Coulee, Glen Canyon and High Arrow Dams. George had a Studebaker before he was out of high school, a '50 Champion. He strayed but got back into Studebakers in 1995 when he went to a show and joined SDC and got a '51 Champion to boot. He also has a 1946 M5 pickup truck and 24 other old cars! That sounds like a lot of work - I'd go on vacation, too. So let's let George take us along on his two month journey this past summer, to see some wonders in Turkey, Sweden, Norway, Russia and the Greek island of Patmus and find out what those folks are driving.

George went to Turkey to visit his friend, a teacher. City driving was fast, streets were narrow, pedestrians were fair game and traffic lights were considered merely a suggestion. Classic '57-8 Chevys, Pontiacs and Mustangs were commonly seen as taxis, otherwise people mostly drive French cars (Renault, Peugeot, Citroen), then cars from east Asia (Kia, Toyota, Hyundai) and finally an assortment of European cars. Dealerships were small and had few cars but long waiting lists. Besides checking out the cars, George and his friend took a fascinating tour of ancient churches in Turkey and Greece.

The travelers then went to Norway where George's mother's family still lives. His grandfather was a carpenter that worked on the last sailing vessel built in Norway. The travelers were greatly interested in their visit at the Maritime Museum. Norway is a wealthy country there were Rolls Royces in the streets and people didn't seem to mind paying the equivalent of \$9.00 a gallon for gas! There are every European and Japanese make of car, new American cars and pick-ups and classic Corvettes, Mustangs and Buicks. Our travelers rented a car and drove 150 miles to visit more family in Stavanger on the west side 150 miles north of the tip of the peninsula. Then they drove on to Sweden. The main highways were fast, but had toll gates costing equivalent to \$2-9 every 10-30 miles. George and his friend soon took to the back roads where the roads were narrow and the driving slow but very beautiful. It was a dream drive, working all six gears through the switchbacks, up fjords and over mountain passes in the rented Czech Skoda with its high rev racing motor.

In Dala Jarnal, Sweden they met George's father's family and visited the Gasala Farm where George's ancestors settled when they arrived from Russia in 1335 (!). Continuing on to Stockholm, the travelers took driving and harbor tours of that beautiful city built on bridges and 52 islands. The highlight was visiting the Viking Museum and seeing the Vasa, a 300 year old sailing warship sunk in the harbor on its maiden voyage and finally pulled out, perfectly preserved, in the 1960s. People mostly drove Saabs and Volvos in Sweden (who knew!) Gas was \$8 per gallon and in a European Common Market country it costs \$8000 to get a drivers license. Public transportation is a popular and efficient alternative. Even though our travelers didn't actually see any Studebakers there is a club there.


After visiting Sweden, George and his friend returned to Istanbul to regroup, then flew to Moscow, Russia for their last adventure before returning home. In Moscow, the political capital of Russia, our travelers took city tours that included Red Square, Lenin's Tomb and the Volga River. Sharp-eyed George not only spotted lots of Ladas but the conspicuous consumption of the latest American cars and luxury cars like a Bentley Sports Coupe and even President Putin's limousine. On a train ride to St. Petersburg, they watched the countryside, forests and logging and small towns roll by. For George, the best part of the train ride was making anew friend, a 2 star General and official of the Russian consulate. This gentleman shared his lunch (lovingly prepared by his aged mother) with George as they chatted away the many long miles on the train. St. Petersburg proved to be the cultural capitol of Russia and our travelers toured the canals, museums and beautiful buildings. George reminded some Russians that Studebakers helped them win their freedom – during WW II 400,000 Studebaker 2 1/2T trucks were shipped to Russia and were eventually copied by the Russian GAZ, Government Auto Works.

After a couple of days George returned to Moscow, then Istanbul, then a harrowing stop over in Phoenix and finally home. Like any good traveler, George is enjoying his trip three times. First, he had 6 months of planning, preparation and anticipation. Second, the trip - 2 months of travel. Third, a lifetime of happy memories and all those pictures, too. Thanks for sharing your trip with us, George! And here's a tip for next time: take a car from your fleet, drive to the east coast, ferry it across the Atlantic, drive to Moscow, then sell it for big American bucks! I'm sure it will pay for your trip – maybe for us to go, too?

Twin Traction Axles Tip

T o put the thrust blocks back in place when replacing a axle shaft or shafts start with a length of 5/16" or 3/8" steel fuel line slightly longer than an axle. Use some steel wire that is smaller in diameter than the little hole in the thrust block, pass the wire through the fuel line and through the thrust block. Put just enough of a bend in the end of the wire that the thrust block will stay on the end of the wire and not move. Hold the fuel line at the other end and pull back on the wire so that the thrust block is held against the end of the fuel line. You can then use this as a "handle" to insert the thrust block. When it is in place, hold it there with the fuel line and withdraw the wire and the thrust block is installed.
