Although the prices of the Mercedes cars were considerably higher than Studebakers and Packards, the pairing was a success. 

On Friday, the 18th of July -

Try to be at the Studebaker Ranch by 5:00 P.M. and at 5:15 we are going to drive over to a friend's home that has an Antique Tractor Museum. His place is only about 5 miles from the ranch.

After everyone has had enough of the tractors, we will come back to the Ranch for pizza and drinks. Then sit around as long as you like.

On Saturday, the 19th of July -

Breakfast is on your own, there are many restaurants to get a good breakfast. Then we will meet at the D & D Furniture lot (center of Show Low on the Duece of Clubs) at 9:00. I will explain the trip and leave by 9:30 A.M. Sharp, We will drive on Rt 260 through Pine Top, Lakeside, McNary and on to Eagar. From the time we leave McNary, start looking on both sides of the road for Deer, Elk, Antelope, etc. Just before we reach Eagar, we will be taking a right turn to a vista; you can see forever from this point. In Eagar we will make a fuel and potty stop.

Then drive on to Nutrioso & Alpine. In Alpine we will stop for lunch. This drive will get you out of the 115/120° heat of the low lands for the weekend. Driving Directions:

From Phoenix, take R-260 in Payson, travel to Heber & Overgaard, go about 20 miles past Overgaard, look for mile post 335.

From Tucson, take R-77 to Globe, R-77/R-60 to Show Low, at the first light you come to turn left onto R-260 and travel to mile post 336. This is about 7 miles or so.

At about mile post 335 & 1/2, look for Lone Pine Dam road, from Phoenix, this will be on your left. From Tucson, this will be on your right. Stay on Lone Pine Dam road for 3 & 1/2 miles, turn left on to Burton Road, (it will turn to dirt at this time) after turning onto Burton Rd., travel about 1 1/4 miles, take your first right, (Turkey Lake Rd.) travel on Turkey Lake Rd. for about 1/2 mile, you will see the Studebaker Ranch on your left, can't miss it, light tan metal building with a 7' neon sign hanging on the front and Studebakers everywhere.

As a reminder, *please bring chairs* and try to get here by 5:00 so you can go with us to the antique tractors.

And as another reminder, please let me know how many are coming at least a week before so I will have enough food, etc.

DON'T MISS LADIES LUNCHEON PLANNED FOR 44TH ANNUAL INTERNATIONAL MEET

On October 14, 1820, an 18 year-old-young lady, Rebecca Mohler from Ephrata, Pennsylvania, was married to John C. Studebaker and moved to the Studebaker family residence near Heidlersburg, Adams County, Pennsylvania. In 1822, their first child, Sarah, was born. Sarah was followed by 4 additional girls and 5 boys. John and Rebecca's five sons founded the Studebaker Wagon Company in 1852.

What does this have to do with the Ladies Luncheon planned for the SDC International Meet being held in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania the week of September 14-20, 2008, you might ask? I feel rather certain Rebecca was an expert quilter as bed covers were needed for her family, and also in the early years of her marriage, her husband earned a meager living as a blacksmith off the beaten path in Adams County, Pennsylvania.

The Keystone Region Chapter SDC, the host chapter for the 44th Annual International Meet, has been fortunate to secure Rachel Thomas Pellman, a knowledgeable speaker on antique Amish quilts. Her subject is "Amish Women and Their Quilts". This one hour slide/lecture presentation provides factual information along with colorful stories and experiences to make the quilts come alive.

Rachel was born and raised in Lancaster County. She is one of 10 children. She has a Home Economics degree from Eastern Mennonite University. Married and mother of two sons; she designs and produces kits for make-it-yourself small appliqué pieced wall quilts, punch-needle embroidery, and Christmas ornaments.

She teaches and lectures at local guilds and has participated in educational programs at the American Folk Art Museum and Sotheby's in NYC. She has authored several books including "AMISH WALL QUILTS" AND "A TREAS-URY OF AMISH QUILTS". Rachel has appeared in the "Lancaster New Era" newspaper and the October 2006 issue of "County Women" magazine.

TECHNICAL INFORMATION

Getting Farther On A Gallon



ELECTRICAL SYSTEM

- Battery trouble, if serious, is usually obvious and may result in some waste of gasoline through slow or hard starting.
- 2. The Coil boasts the battery current of about 6 volts to more than 10,000 volts. If at fault it may prevent easy starting or may cause irregular firing in the engine.
- 3. Distributor Points make and break electrical circuits at the rate of from 150 to more depending upon the number of cylinders and speed of operation. Timing is apt to grow late with use of a car. You may no9tice it as gradual loss of engine pep. Inaccurate timing, burned points, or worn distributor pars can cause considerable gasoline waste.
- 4. The Octane Selector permits your engine to be adjusted to the particular octane rating of the gasoline you. Usually it should be advance to the point at which you get some "ping" on rapid acceleration at slow speeds, but not enough to affect general performance.
- 5. Spark Plugs can waste large amounts of your gasoline. Improperly spaced, burned or "coked" electrodes or cracked porcelains are among the most common causes of trouble. The noticeable effect from the driver's seat may be lack of power or intermittent firing. There are different types of spark plugs. In selecting replacements, be sure to get the right heat range for your particular make and model of car. Old plugs can often be cleaned.


How old are your tires?

ind the whole series of miscellaneous numbers molded into the sidewall right along the edge of the tire, near the bead, but still visible with the tire mounted on a wheel. The last group of numbers will be the week and year in which the tire was made.

Examples: 0901 means the tire was made in the 9th week of 2001. 176 means the tire was made in the 17th week of 1996. 4907 means the tire was made in the 49th week of 2007.
