He IS A SHERIFF!

We look for a "typical Western sheriff" in Arizona. Everywhere, we are told, "see Walter Bailey," sheriff of Pima county, which is 178 miles wide and 80 miles north to south.

In the old courthouse at Tucson we see a great, big fellow, well above six feet, wearing a wide panama hat, disappear into the sheriff's office.

The first glance, catching the hat, seemed to promise much.

Then we are in his office. Here rises a soft-voiced, smilingly pleasant man, with clear, blue eyes and long curling lashes that any school girl would prize.

Below his blue coat are white flannel trousers, white socks and white, rubber-soled shoes. Good Heavens! A sheriff?

His voice is low and gentle. He "doesn't remember" any rough work of his office. Why, he might as well have just stepped of his million dollar yacht, or have come in from the exclusive country club.

A sheriff!

The clear, blue eye, typical of every sheriff on the border, is the only straw to grasp. He talks about his friend, Harold Bell Wright, noted novelist, and their happy days together. Then we mention six shooters—the single-action, long-barreled 45's of the frontiersman.

Smilingly and almost apologetically, he pulls out from the skirt of his country club coat a weapon that brings shivers with it. No movie gun that Bill Hart ever carried was a more desperate looking weapon than this horn-handled, silvermounted junior field piece.

But, somehow, it fits his hand so customarily! He drew it out slowly, but there are those in Arizona and Mexico- and others not living now-who could tell that this self-same weapon can come from his hip holster so fast that lightning seems to be going backward.

And then he just mentions when he got it. Nearly a quarter of a century ago, when he was a line rider for customs houses. Line rider!

That meant traveling 1,200 miles, on horseback, back and forth from El Paso to Yuma, across the loneliest American desert, where an occasional jack rabbit or cottontail was a friend and a rattle-

snake and a gila monster no longer were enemies because they, too, were living things out on the wide stretches.

It meant long, eager watches for the remote wells which gave life for another day for a man and beast. It meant smugglers, rum runners, criminals trying to get into Mexico; it meant all the ruggedness of pioneer days, even out there.

What a background of hardship, of adventure, of peril and danger, to yield this six-foot product of the soft voice, the gentle manner.

Walter Bailey IS a sheriff! Those clear, blue eyes are the channel through which all the guickness of draw. the swiftness of trigger finger, and fearlessness of those days agone, come like a flash when trouble breaks out in Pima County.

Walter Bailey is more than a sheriff. He is a true westerner. A native of Arizona, the man who took a party through desert mirages and dug water for them out of the sand, and who speaks today courteously and with infinite friendliness is the same man, the typical westerner.

The old-time cow pony has given way to a swift Studebaker, which may account for the yacht costume, but let trouble start! The car goes like a flash where no

cow pony could have traveled, and this gentle appearing man is steel again, matching the unyielding stamina of his Studebaker car by enduring nights and days of ceaseless hunting, long after less durable folk would have broken down.

Walter Bailey is, indeed, a sheriff!

Technical Tip



Messing With a V8 Distributor

Background: One of the challenges with a Studebaker V8 engine is the location of the hard to reach distributor. Studebaker engineers, in their advanced wisdom, placed the unit at the rear of the engine, behind the intake manifold and the valley pan. The only advantage found with this remote placement is the fact that an engine won't stall out by splashing water when accelerating through puddles. That is not the case in Ford and other miscreant V8s where the distributor is placed at the front of the engine. Setting or replacing points and condensers is difficult, as in installing the distributor cap and or wires. Adjusting timing can be time consuming. Replacing a distributor is vexing.

The Fix: Recently, I discovered a technique that eliminates the hardship in replacing the distributor. The distributor is held in place by the lock plate with a 5/16th coarse threaded, one inch hexagon head screw. Once the distributor has been removed, replace the bolt that was removed with a 5/16 x 18 stud, one inch or longer, in the threaded hole where the lock plate screw resided. After the distributor has been properly installed, place the lock plate over the protruding threaded stud. Secure the lock plate with a 5/16" lock washer and nut. No more groping to align the old screw through the lock plate and dropping it or misaligning it. Then, tighten the nut on the stud. The distributor is secure.

The Benefit: A realistic estimate places the time saved with this innovative technique at three days, six hours and eleven minutes each time the distributor is removed and replaced.

MY FIRST STUDEBAKER(s) By Larry Vahe

Like many of you, I read with interest about different members' first Studebakers; there truly are a 100 stories in the Naked City! Like all good stories you should start at the beginning. It all started in the fall of 1965 in Long Beach, CA. I was headed off to college, flush with money (not too likely but it makes for good reading) and looking for a car. A friend of mine from high school's father worked for the Studebaker dealer in Compton, CA, Caldwell Motors.

In 1965 my friend was driving a Bordeaux Red 1964 Hawk complete with half vinyl roof. I thought it was a great looking car (and still do) so I started looking for Hawks. Well, the '64s were well out of my price range (ignore the comment about excess money above) but a nice Ermine white 1962 Hawk was for sale at the local Long Beach dealer, Palmer Motors. It had the standard black interior and only the center dash gauges. After driving my friends '64 with full instrumentation I became spoiled. What to do? Back to Palmer Motors, and yes, they had all the parts including the correct dash board that accommodated the tach and clock. Lucky me! Unlucky Palmer Motors! I guess they forgot what a problem it was to install full instrumentation and afterwards made it abundantly clear that they really had no more interest in Studebakers, thank you very much. By 1966 they had switched over to selling Mercedes, which they still do to this day. Studebakers, not so much. I believe they made mention of a nice Studebaker dealer in Yuma that would do work on my Studebaker but that's another story.

Now comes the year 1967. While in route to pick up a friend to go to college a lady in a VW bug blew through an intersection at 36th and Olive and hit the '62 Hawk right at the passenger door post. For some reason she had some bags of cement in the back seat and all I remember after she hit me was clouds of grey cement floating over the intersection! I guess one good thing was it was not raining! Remembering the dire warnings of Palmer Motors I took the Hawk up to Caldwell Motors for repairs. They very graciously gave me a well used 1952 DeSoto as a loaner! Ah, those were the good old days!

As 1967 gave way to 1968 I found the Hawk just did not drive like it used to so I sold it to a friend who needed a car after his '55 Mercury Turnpike Cruiser gave out. Time to look for another Studebaker! I joined the Studebaker Drivers Club in 1967, Beach Cities Chapter, and while looking through their cars for sale I happened across a Speedster for sale. It was located in San Bernardino, CA, low mileage and the asking price was \$1,500. For a 13 year old car, hmmmm, a lot of money but being as how I was single (see the first part about having a lot of money) and in need of a car I decided to at least to take a look. When I arrived at Airy Covington's (he was the seller) house I found someone else looking at the Speedster. Airy had a small house surrounded by a lot of trees. In and around his property I remember seeing a '63 Hawk and a quite lovely green '64 Champ pickup. The Speedster was parked in a single car garage in the back of the house. After looking at the car the other guy said it was way too dusty and way too expensive for a 13 year old car. He was probably right.

As it turned out Airy bought the car from the local San Bernardino Studebaker dealer, Warren & Day, and drove it for a year, commuting to Victorville, CA. In 1957 he drove the car to Little Rock, AR, put it in the garage when he got back and did not drive it again. The car did give a new meaning to dusty as I could hardly see what color the car was for all the dirt. After some discussion we agreed on a price and the car was all mine! As it turned out he drove his '64 truck to the Grand Canyon whereupon it became stuck in some sand. Rather than chance having it damaged while being towed out he decided to dig it out by hand. In so doing he pulled some muscles and ended up selling the Speedster to pay for his medical bills. I also received a copy of every repair order done on the Speedster including the first work order from Warren & Day dated January 1957 for a lube job costing \$1.50! Those really were the days! For many years the Speedster was my daily ride and in the intervening 40 years have driven it all over the west and, yes, kept every repair bill.

On a closing note, and perhaps a bit of a mystery (at least to me) is the numbering on the SDC membership cards. I joined SDC prior to 1968 and have my card for 1967 signed by Harry Barnes and Ray McLaughlin but it contains no membership number. My membership card for 1968, signed by Harry Barnes and Paul Gunder, shows I'm now member 322! Perhaps I'm reading more into this than there is so probably they just picked 1968 as the year to start issuing membership numbers. There are some 321 members with lower numbers than mine and was just wondering if any of them belong to chapter members? I certainly remember the gentlemen who signed my cards all those years ago; Paul Gunder was the one who talked me into joining SDC after I attended a SDC meeting in South Gate, CA and we remained friends until he moved back to his native state of Ohio.

Anyway, long forgotten lore about days gone by, just another one of the 100 or so stories in the Naked City.


