Member dues finance all club services as well as the operations of the national organization.



The Grand Canyon State Chapter hosted another successful All Arizona Studebaker Gathering, March 19th at South Mountain Park in Phoenix. Nearly sixty Studebaker cars and trucks assembled in the parking lot of the Holbert Trail picnic area on a bright, sunny Saturday for our annual March Madness event. The Chapter board members set up canopies and a table for registration, greeted Studebaker drivers as they arrived, handed out goody bags and dash plaques and sold raffle tickets. The hot dog vendor arrived bright and early along with a few members who set up to vend Studebaker treasures.

As the morning progressed, the valve cover race track was assembled and racing began. Later in the afternoon all of the racers were awarded a gift for participating in the first ever March Madness Valve Cover Races.

Another first this year was a tech session led by Bill Eastburn which several attended. Thank you, Bill.

The Arizona Avanti Owners Association celebrated its 10th anniversary at the same event at which it held its inaugural meeting - March Madness in 2001. Along with a nice showing of Avantis, the occasion was celebrated with a luncheon and cake.

The day closed with the chapter president Ed Smith, assisted by Kolton Kroulik, awarding raffle prizes to 23 lucky winners. Then, fun judging awards were presented. The Hardtop award was given by Dennis Lynde to Mike Barany for driving his 1956 Golden Hawk. Chris Collins chose Toto as the Studebaker in most need of detailing (the truck had been sprayed with a mud like material for a movie shot the previous two days). Will Eastburn driving his 1957 Scotsman sedan (it's definitely not his grandfather's Scotsman) received an award from Ed Smith for the Nosiest Studebaker. Finally, John Rodhouse presented Don Robertson with the award for having the Studebaker Most Likely to Get a Ticket, the 1928 race car.

Receiving recognition for their participation in the valve cover races were Lou Fencl, Bob Losbough, Aubrey Eastburn, Bill Eastburn, Domenica Eastburn, Ed Smith and Kolton Kroulik.

Prior to the awards, Ed presented Larry Vahe with a plaque in appreciation for his role as the meet chairman of the 46th International SDC Meet held in Glendale this past June and with a gift in honor of his four years as Chapter president.

Thanks to all who attended from nearly every corner of the state including our friends from our sister chapter in southern Arizona and the AAOA members. Special thanks to Steve Fein and Karen Mensing for their assistance at registration, to Ed and Linda Smith for all of their hard work with preparations for the meet and to all who donated prizes for the raffle. We'll see you at next year's March Madness hosted by the Southern Arizona Chapter and then, in 2013, it'll be back here in the Valley.

GRAND CANYON STATE CHAPTER - The purpose of the Grand Canyon State Chapter shall be to promote a closer relationship among the owners of Studebaker vehicles in the state of Arizona. It shall promote expansion of membership, nationally and locally, in both organizations, and to provide assistance to the national organization on the local level. To encourage the acquisition, preservation and maintenance of Studebaker and related vehicles which at one time produced by Studebaker, such as EMF, Flanders, Garford, Rockne, Erskine, Piece Arrow, Packard and Avanti. To publish a newsletter announcing the coming events and containing other pertinent information of membership interest.

STUDEBAKER NATIONAL FOUNDATION - Preserving the past and supporting the future. As a non-profit public benefit corporation, the purpose is to raise money to provide funds for various charitable and educational purposes that are related to all aspects of Studebaker. The Foundation will provide support in the following ways:

1. For parts and restoration of antique automobiles in museums across the nation.

2. To support education for auto restoration classes in junior colleges, colleges or trade schools in the U.S.

3. To provide scholarships to students interested in restoration and automobiles.

4. To provide written materials, films and restoration of existing films and promotion showing the contribution made by American automobile companies and to encourage authors to write articles on the automobile.

STUDEBAKER NATIONAL MUSEUM - Its mission is to honor and perpetuate the legacy of the rich industrial heritage of the South Bend area, through the display, interpretation, conservation and preservation of Studebaker vehicles, archives and other objects to enrich present and future generations. The Museum is intended to be a fitting memorial to men and women of our community whose vision, creativity and energy built the products that are today our industrial manufacturing heritage. The vision is to keep the flame of the Studebaker tradition alive and burning for generations to come. They have restructured to reinvest the monies into educational programming and social media.

The Studebaker National Museum has 120 vehicles in the collection. The collection includes the Studebaker Corporation's "original collection" of 37 vehicles that were given to the City of South Bend in 1966. The Museum displays approximately 70 vehicles at any time, with an additional 40 vehicles are kept in "visible storage" in the Museum's lower level. The collection features several one-of-a-kind vehicles including the 1956 Packard Predictor and the 1934 Bendix SWC, the first and last automobiles built in South Bend, and the last Studebaker ever built. The Studebaker National Museum Archives contain over 70 tons of paper documents, including corporate minutes, correspondence, records, etc. from The Studebaker Corporation and Packard Motor Car Co. The Archive collection also includes over 400,000 engineering drawings, photos, production records, newspaper articles and other artifacts.

From The Toy Box

This toy review is for the M2 Machines 1950 Studebaker 2R Snow-Plow Truck. It is a 2010 release made by M2 Auto-Thentics a registered trademark for Castline, Inc. Arcadia, CA, also known as M2 Machines.

The toy was released in two different styles of packages. It is available in a plastic bubble wrap carton and as a box with a hard plastic display case. Both varieties have the hard plastic base with the title 1950 Studebaker 2R.

The toy is die-cast body and bed. The toy is very well detailed for its 1/64 scale. It has a divided plastic windshield with a chrome divider bar. The doors and hood open and shut. The front edge of the hood has the Studebaker block

scripts. The top center has the familiar Bullet Hood ornament in chrome. The lower rear corner of the hood has a chromed Stude-



baker block script. Under the hood is a very nice detailed 6 cylinder engine with silver painted head, black air cleaner, manifold, battery and a red oil filter. The grille is correct for 1950 and has silver/white painted louvers with black insides to simulate space. It has chrome headlight rings and glass looking headlights. It is equipped with a pick-up box with a tailgate that has Studebaker stamped in the center. The front and rear bumpers are chrome. It also sports two chrome taillight housings with a red lens and a license plate that reads 1950. It also has a chrome trailer hitch. Inside the cab is a nicely detailed interior with tan seats, a black dash and steering wheel.


Inside the doors are window cranks, door handles and arm rests. The dash even sports the utility dash/ dome light.

The wheels are painted body color with small chrome hub caps and black tires.

Mounted on the front of the truck is a very reallooking snow plow attachment. It has a red plow blade with a black mounting frame. It also has headlights mounted on brackets that extend above the blade. The lights have white painted lens. Between the headlight brackets is a motor box to control the movement of the blade.

The chassis is serviceable but does not have the same quality of detailing displayed in the rest of the toy. Also, the rear cab window appears to be the later wider style adopted by Studebaker in 1955.

TECHNICAL INFORMATION

HOSE MAINTENANCE

Until recently, the most common method of checking an engine coolant hose was by visual inspection of the outside for signs of wear. Obvious signs of "ballooning" under pressure and physical damage are easy to spot but what you can't see is what you really need to know about. Recent research has shown that most hoses fail from the inside out.

During a four-year field test on fleet vehicles, engineers for the Gates Rubber Company identified the primary cause of coolant hose failure as an electrochemical attack on the surface of the inside of the hose. This is called electrochemical degradation or ECD.

This produces fine cracks in the tube wall. These cracks extend from the inside to the outside of the hose near one or both ends of the hose. The coolant begins to seep through these cracks and attack the hose reinforcement material. The braided cloth-like acts like a wick along the length of the hose, providing an avenue for the coolant to migrate. This condition usually results in a pinhole leak or a burst hose.

The most severe damage occurs where temperatures are the hottest and air is present which is why the upper radiator hoses tend to fail first.

The best way to check coolant hoses for these pending failures is squeeze the hose near the clamps using the following steps.

- Make sure the engine is cool.
- Use your finger and thumb to check for weakness, not your whole hand.
- Squeeze within two inches of the clamps.
- Check the difference between the middle and ends of the hose.
- If the ends feel mushy, replacement is recommended.

A replacement interval of four years for all coolant hoses, especially upper radiator hoses, can help to prevent failures. This is similar to the current recommendation to replace tires after four years. Failure rates increase sharply after fours years. For cars stored or seldom used this time period could be extended but degrading takes place just sitting. (This is a plug to get those cars out and drive them, they degrade anyway.) High mileage or severe stop and go driving will reduce the four year recommendation.

Another plug for maintenance is the fact our Studebakers are 50 or more years old. There are a lot of hidden potential failures lurking inside your pride and joy. Good prevention will reduce the chance of being stuck beside the road or "earning" the Hard Luck Award.




