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BIGGER THAN LIFE

There are a lot of things going on right now that appear to be bigger than life. Events like the Royal Wedding, the Last Space Shuttle, and the birth certificate. These are all well and good and will be forgotten in few more weeks as something else takes their place in the spotlight, These type of bigger than life events have happened in the past also. I don't mean the other royal wedding and royal divorce, or the first shuttle. There was a bigger than life event for a Studebaker.

In the 1920s and 30s, Studebaker was one of the most prominent national companies insofar as advertising and publicity were concerned. Of course, Studebaker had a full line of attractive offerings to publicize with both six and eight cylinder engines and numerous body styles. They could also publicize their remarkable achievements in both speed and endurance runs held throughout the country. By the late 20s, Studebaker could boast of holding every official endurance and speed record for fully equipped stock cars regardless of power or price.

Radio was becoming increasingly popular and Studebaker was quick to recognize the advertising potential of the new medium and introduced the Studebaker Champions Orchestra. The program became quite popular and by 1930, Studebaker ranked third behind only Ford and GM in money spent on radio advertising. In many listener surveys the band itself was ranked at or near the top. The "Champions" name was an obvious reference to the championship performance exhibited by the Studebaker cars on the speedways and roadways of America. To emphasize the connection, the band often

posed for publicity photos wearing pit crew type white coveralls.

By the second anniversary of the President record runs at Atlantic City, Studebaker was preparing to introduce a new line of cars in the spring of 1930 and someone devised a brilliant plan to combine this introduction with the Studebaker orchestra and the new medium of talking pictures. The result was "Wild Flowers", an unusual sound picture featuring the "Studebaker Champions" and "The world's largest automobile".

The plan involved the creation of a movie short that would combine an entertaining and enjoyable sound motion picture with some not so subtle Studebaker advertising. The focal point in the cinematic production would be a new 1931 model 80 Studebaker Four Season Roadster, While the movie would be primarily a musical production, it also contained a clever plot of young love. The movie's opening scenes show a young couple riding through the country on a beautiful spring day in their new President roadster. Seeing a field of flowers, the young lady requests of her companion to stop while she gathers a bouquet. While waiting for her to return, the young man turns on the car radio and falls asleep. In his reverie, he sees a monstrous car identical to his own but loaded with peppy musicians who regale him with popular tunes. A gigantic replica of the new President eight four-season free wheeling roadster, is used by the famous radio orchestra. Of course, the featured prop in the film is the "monstrous" car. To create this behemoth would require the talents of sixty men and three months' labor to complete. It was built to commemorate the second anniversary of the world-famous 30,000-mile run of four stock President eights at Atlantic City in 1928.

The length of the car they created was 41 feet with a wheelbase of 325". It was 13 1/2 feet high, 15 feet wide, and weighed 5 1/2 tons. The wire wheels were the most exacting to make and each one was six feet eight inches in diameter and weighed 600 lbs. Firestone made the specially constructed tires, which replicated the originals to perfection. The steering wheel was 44" in diameter and the oval head lights 33 1/2". The huge dimensions of the



car can be attested by the fact that 22 members of the Studebaker Champions Orchestra were accommodated in the driver's compartment with ample additional room for eight or ten more.

The film lasted only nine minutes and was meant as a "filler" for theater managers to fill out a program. According to Studebaker publicity, it played extensively in RKO theaters coast-to-coast. An industry publication said this

about the film:

One of the cleverest, if not the best, advertising reel we have ever seen is one just produced on behalf of the Studebaker automobile. It brings in the Studebaker Champions, so well known to radio audiences, and they use a giant motor car as the stage for their entertainment. The music is excellent, the treatment is novel, and the sum total is far and away superior to nine out of ten of the short subjects now on the market as legitimate show material.

The success and popularity of the giant wooden car lead Studebaker officials to create a similar Giant car for the 1934 Chicago World's Fair. This car represented the new aerodynamic Land Cruiser body and it was made of plaster. So large was it that it housed a movie theater capable of seating 80 people who were treated to promotional films showing Studebaker cars being endurance tested.

This year let us try to get the Studebaker name back to the bigger than life event. Talk to a board member and tell them what you want to do to be remembered as the Grand Canyon State Chapter, Studebakers Drivers Club.



ANOTHER ARIZONA TREASURE DISCOVERED

At March Madness I had the opportunity to chat with someone I have wanted to meet for quite sometime, Gary Olson from Fargo, North Dakota. Come to find out he has a 1959 Studebaker as I do; however, his is a 4X4, quite rare by anyone's standards.

One thing leads to another, as Studebaker stories go, and he tells me he recently purchased a '63 Studebaker Diesel truck in Florence, AZ. He purchased it from a rancher who had owned it for 30 years. The truck came from New York State where it provided service on a sheep farm.

Also quite rare, his Diesel is one of 65 built in 1963. It is a one-ton, Model 8E15-131-C4, Serial No. E15-106, and the sixth diesel manufactured on July 16, 1962.



Notice the white parking lights, indicating an early manufacture date.

It came from the factory with a tachometer mounted on the steering column, 5.13 gear ration, five speed/ overdrive transmission, flatbed, 353-3 cylinder diesel engine and Apache Red paint.

According to Gary there are only three similar trucks known to exist. He has been doing research at the Studebaker National Museum and believes his truck is the same one pictured in a factory photo found in the archives.

Gary's find makes two Diesels recently discovered in Arizona. Could there be other Studebaker Treasures lurking out there waiting to be found by a lucky Club member?




Photo from 1963 Studebaker advertising brochure.

Resolution Designating July 8, 2011, as "Collector Car Appreciation Day" Approved by U.S. Senate

At the request of SEMA and its Automotive Restoration Market Organization (ARMO) and Hot Rod Industry Alliance (HRIA) councils, Senator John Tester (D-MT) and Senator Richard Burr (R-NC) have introduced and the Senate has approved Senate Resolution 154 (S. Res. 154) in the United States Senate, officially designating July 8, 2011, as "Collector Car Appreciation Day." S. Res. 154 states that the Senate "recognizes that the collection and restoration of historic and classic cars is an important part of preserving the technological achievements and cultural heritage of the United States."

The date marks the second commemoration in what will become an annual event to raise awareness of the vital role automotive restoration and collection plays in American society. "Last year, the U.S. Senate helped launch the first national Collector Car Appreciation Day by passing Senate Resolution 513 at our request," said SEMA Vice President of Government Affairs Steve McDonald. "As a result, thousands of Americans gathered at car cruises, parades and other events to celebrate our nation's automotive heritage. As we move forward, SEMA's commitment to preserving and promoting the automotive-restoration industry through its projects and programs is evident in this special day."

Senators Tester and Burr, both members of the Congressional Automotive Performance and Motorsports Caucus, have been strong advocates for the automotive hobby in Washington. By sponsoring S. Res. 154, Tester and Burr have reaffirmed their understanding of the cultural importance of collector cars. The caucus is an informal, non-partisan group that pays tribute to America's ever-growing love affair with the car and motorsports. The caucus recognizes the integral role collector cars have played in fostering our nation's appreciation for the automobile's unique place in our history.

Business owners, car clubs and individuals are encouraged to organize events to help celebrate the day. TECHNICAL INFORMATION



PREPARING YOUR STUDEBAKER OR BRAND X FOR SUMMER TRAVELS

The Checklist:

Battery - Inspect your battery for corrosion around the terminals, tight cable connections and visual signs of leaks.

Belts/Hoses/Wiper Blades - Visually inspect your hoses for leaks, bulges and signs of corrosion at connection points. Check belts visually and feel the undersides for dryness and cracking. Manually test the operation for blades and check for cracks in the rubber.

Tires - Tires should be checked monthly for tread wear and embedded debris. Do the penny test - stick a penny into the tread and if the tread doesn't extend past Lincoln's head, it's time for new tires. Also, check and set tire pressure to manufacturer's specs.

Air Conditioning - Have your car's AC system checked by your trusted auto repair shop.

Cooling System - Ask to have your entire cooling system checked at the same time as your AC system check.

Remember, car batteries and rubber components do not fare well in our desert heat and good car maintenance will prevent roadside emergencies.

Work is progressing on the demolition of the former Studebaker engineering building and previous home of SASCO at 410 W. Sample Street in South Bend. Demolition began in January on this building and the former Studebaker foundry at 1100 Prairie Ave. These were the final two Studebaker buildings in Ignition Park.

InsidelNdianaBusiness.com reports, "Before demolition, crews removed historic artifacts such as the Studebaker wheel medallion and the cornerstone on the former engineering building, which were given to the Studebaker National Museum. The "S" medallions, located along the parapet of the former foundry, also were saved. The guard shack located on the south side of Sample Street along with adjacent brick pillars and wrought-iron fencing were previously disassembled and put in storage for future re-construction at a yet-to-bedetermined site." This is good news for Studebaker fans.

In the spring issue of *Hagerty*, a publication of the Hagerty insurance company, Studebakers are featured in the Marketwatch column. Speedsters and Avantis are touted as two Studebaker models with increasing values. Another Studebaker reference is the inclusion of the Studebaker National Museum in an article about automotive museums based in Indiana.

Arizona Bill to Exempt Older Vehicles from Emissions Inspection Signed Into Law

egislation to exempt all vehicles manufactured in the 1974 model year and earlier from the state's mandatory biennial emissions inspection program was signed into law by Governor Jan Brewer. Under previous law, only vehicles manufactured in 1966 and earlier and "collectibles" were exempt. Under Federal law, Arizona must first submit a plan to the EPA detailing how they will address the state's air quality issues. Changes to the state's inspection and maintenance program must be approved by the EPA as part of the state's plan. The Arizona Department of Environmental Quality estimates that it will take between 12-18 months to develop and submit a proposal to incorporate the exemption changes into the plan for submission to the EPA. The EPA will then have another 18 months to approve or reject the alteration.

In the meantime, the current exemptions for pre-1967 vehicles and "collectibles" remain in effect, and will continue to be available even after the implementation of the new exemption. To qualify for the "collectible" exemption, the vehicle must be maintained primarily for use in club activities, exhibitions, parades or other functions of public interest and have a collectible vehicle or classic automobile insurance policy that restricts the collectible vehicle's mileage and/or use. The owner must also own a secondary vehicle for general transportation.

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
