

Then, upon arrival at the meeting place there sat this gangster looking car along the tree covered street

He proceeded to show us the car. No dents, little rust, ok interior but it was mine now so I couldn't say much for buying sight unseen. The trip home was not without incident. As I was winding my way through the Utah mountains I turned one corner and there without warning was a road full of deer. I slammed the brakes and slam a deer at the same time. They are jumping everywhere and as I look in the rear view to see if all was ok there I saw a deer jump between the truck and trailer and my only thought was DON'T HIT THAT CAR! Upon final arrival at the house the Stude was unloaded and checked over. It was washed, waxed, and the oil changed and then just a couple of days later my parents were taken to their 50th wedding anniversary in that lovely Studebaker Land Cruiser.

Coalition Formed to Save the Bonneville Salt Flats

A number of prominent organizations have formed a "Save the Salt Coalition" to save the Bonneville Salt

Flats (BSF) from continued deterioration due to salt brine removal from potash mining. The Coalition is working with government officials, mine operators and others to develop a permanent program to replenish the salt.

The founding members of the Coalition include SEMA Action Network (SAN), the Bonneville Nationals, Save the Salt Foundation, Source Interlink Media, Southern California Time



Assoc., SEMA and the Utah Salt Flats Racing Assoc.

The BSF is a unique geological formation that is also central to the history of motorsports and the industries that support motorsports. Scores of world land speed records have been set on the densely packed remnants of a huge prehistoric lake. The BSF has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places and has been designated an Area of Critical Environmental Concern.

2nd prize for Gas Hog – Jerry Volk with 4.7 gal costing 17.30


Brand X: George Gezelius with his Ford Thunderbird and 6.27 gal costing 23.89.



DETERMINING REAR END GEAR RATIO By Pat Dilling


If you are evaluating a car or a rear end, and want to know the gear ratio, there are several ways to determine it. First choice is to see if there is a tag on the rear end that tells you. But we are dealing with 50+ year old cars and often times the tags are gone or possibly the gears have been changed.

First thing to do is determine if it is a twin traction or open differential. Raise both rear wheels off the ground and with the car in gear or park try to turn one of the wheels. If you are able to turn a wheel and the other wheel turns in the opposite direction, the differential is open. If you are not able to turn it, put the car in neutral and try again. Both wheels should turn in the same direction. That would be a twin traction or locked differential.

So now how do we find the approximate ratio? If it is an open rear end, set one wheel back on the ground and put the car in neutral. Chock a front wheel to make sure the car does not roll. Take some chalk or painters tape and put it at the top of the tire to mark it's position. Also mark the drive shaft so you can count revolutions. Now turn the tire two complete cycles and count the number of times the drive shaft goes around. That will be the approximate ratio, for example if the drive shaft goes around just over 4 times, you have a 4.09 ratio, 3.5 times would be 3.55 etc.

Turning the tire around twice makes allowance for the open differential action. Now if you have a twin traction or locked differential, make the same markings and turn the tire around just once and count the drive shaft revolutions. That count will be your approximate ratio. The way to determine exact ratio is to open up the rear end and count the teeth. Divide the number of teeth on the ring gear by the number of teeth on the pinion and you will have the ratio.

U.S.P.S. COMMEMORATES 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE INDIANAPOLIS 500

"On May 30, 1911, Ray Harroun blazed across the finish line at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, winning the first Indianapolis 500 Mile Race in #32, the black-and-yellow Marmon "Wasp" he designed himself. This Indianapolis 500 (Forever®) stamp celebrates the centennial of that race, an American tradition now billed as "The Greatest Spectacle in Racing" and hailed as one of the most significant auto races in the world.

This 2011 stamp depicts Ray Harroun in the customized yellow-and-black "Wasp" in which he won the first Indianapolis 500 in 1911. The car was built by the Indianapolis-based Marmon Motor Car Company and included one of Harroun's own inventions, the rearview mirror. Today, the car is a prime attraction at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum."


