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

The Studebaker Wheel was a publication of The Studebaker Corporation. Richard Quinn wrote in the July/ August 2009 issue of the *Antique Studebaker Review*, "It was introduced in February 1926 as an owner's magazine and within a period of just seven years one million copies were being printed every month and circulated throughout much of the world.

"The Wheel was always issued in a magazine format and featured original art on the front cover with each being "season related" and featuring a Studebaker vehicle. Most issues contained 24 pages and all four covers had Studebaker related ads or photos. Original articles on a variety of topics were included within. Of course travel features were popular as were stories on noted people of the era including writers, sports figures, politician and Hollywood notables."

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From the President..... Hard luck story

There have been a lot of hard luck stories and we heard one at our international and we heard another at the Springfield International this year. There is



always someone there to tell you how much trouble they had getting somewhere or doing something. I am here today to tell you a hard luck story. I drove to Springfield towing a 1925 two door Studebaker sedan. I really had a very uneventful journey as I proceeded to stop at every other gas station to prey on the unwary with \$10 winning tickets. The time there was pretty much standard as you learn more than you want to about what went on prior to the start of the event. Traveling toward home seemed at times as if I was going backwards as I battled construction, dust, wind and rain. This is not really a hard luck story as everyone had to put up with all these things.

A real hard luck story was what I encountered on the return trip. I made a detour through a town called Joplin. There has been a plethora of natural disaster plaguing the US this year with severe winters and cold, fires, flooding, and tornadoes. On May 22, 2011, an extremely powerful EF-5 tornado struck the city of Joplin. We have read about this and seen video in the news, on youtube, and many other places but to drive through the area you can see the actual destruction.

This EF-5 tornado didn't just damage trees and break windows or randomly remove a roof. It actually ripped buildings right off their foundation, depositing some of them as far as 5 miles away from their original site.

Over 900 injuries and a death toll of 155 and still climbing is an amazing survival fact when you drive through the actual destruction. A hospital no longer has windows or a second floor, the grocery store and strip mall now have a larger parking lot but there is no place to shop. Apartment complexes look like scattered scrap lumber yards, businesses now get to restart from the ground up. Thousands, I mean thousands, of houses no longer exist. This is a real hard luck story.

If we were to look at this in local terms, being about the same size as Joplin, take a look at Tempe, AZ. Now think about one third of it being totally destroyed with houses ripped from their foundations. That would be an area from Mill to Country Club between Broadway and Southern and most of the rest of Tempe is in desperate need of repair from roofs gone, to deformed skyscrapers and only tree trunks remaining.

What is the purpose of this hard luck story? Those of us in the Grand Canyon State Chapter, Stude-baker Driver Club don't have it as bad as those in Joplin, MO., and because of that we have an opportunity to help those with super hard luck stories. It would be great for the chapter to support a local cause or those with a hard luck case. Any suggestions would be appreciated, for


instance a children's or teen group as we are trying to attract younger interest in our wonderful autos. Let us know of any ideas you may have so we can bring it up to the board and other chapter members.

Installing Vent Window Seals

he installation was done on a 1955 coupe but is the same for other cars.

Got the new vent window seals and tried to install them without instructions. Started with the top end. When I got to the bottom end, the seal was at least 2 inches too long.

Pulled it back out and started with the bottom end (as if that would make a difference). The seal was at least 2 inches too long.

Pulled it back out and started where the pivot pin goes through the seal. The top end was at least 1 1/2 inches too long and the bottom was at least 1/2 inch too long.

Called Bill Fennessey. He is a very nice, friendly, elderly gentleman. In the nicest way he could, he told me I was an idiot and I didn't know what I was doing (I agreed with him) and he had sold thousands of those seals and no one else had ever had a problem with them. Then he told me the correct way to install the seals.

- Put the seal in the channel where the pivot pin goes through.
- Put the end of the seal in place.
- Put the other end of the seal in place.
- In between the pivot pin and the ends, the seal will be bowed out away from the channel (due to it being too long) (not really). Work these bowed out sections of the seals into the channel and you're done.

I did and it did and I now have vent windows installed.

For Sale: 1939 STUDEBAKER CHAMPION

This car was manufactured at the Studebaker factory in England as the last production before the outbreak of World War II. It was purchased by a Norwegian, whose family name was Krognes, and shipped to his home of Oslo. When Norway was invaded, he, like hundreds of his fellow Norwegians, took the car to the mountains north of Oslo and hid it to keep it from being seized by the Germans. His family was building a new mountain cabin, or "Hytte", and the basement had already been dug. They built a ramp down into the basement, drove the car down into the pit, and covered the car with a tarp, hay and lumber to hide it completely. There it spent the duration of World War II.

After, the owner retrieved it and drove it daily until he suffered a stroke in 1956. The car was stored and turned over to his nephew, also named Krognes, who did a partial restoration and drove the car occasionally. He sold it to the father of the present owners, (he was an Air Force officer stationed in Oslo) in 1972. His three children inherited the car last August following his death. So over seven decades, this vehicle has had only 3 owners. The car has been in storage here in Great Falls since 1984. Their father had always intended to do a complete restoration on the vehicle at some point and had, over many years, purchased many used & NOS parts for the car. These parts are part of the purchase price. Most of these would be unavailable today, making this a great deal for someone interested in this unique automobile.

It's nothing but tear drops for this Studebaker driver



When Arlyn Lohman drives off to this year's SDC International in Springfield, Mo., he'll be towing his own host hotel behind his Champion convertible. And that's the way it has been for several years as his homemade tear drop

trailer follows him from car show to car show. "It will be my hotel as usual," Lohman said. "Let's face it, I'm Dutch and I can save so much money using it. It has everything I need and is comfortable."

Although his flaming purple Studebaker convertible attracts its share of attention by its own right, Lohman acknowledges the trailer at times gets even more accolades from admirers. "I take it to at least half of the car shows I attend," he said. "In fact, if I don't take it, people ask me where my trailer is."

Lohman came up with the idea of build-



Through his research, Lohman found plans printed more than 70 years ago in *Popular Mechanics* for a nation just discovering the great American road trip. Lohman wasn't satisfied with these plans and was "too Dutch" to purchase more up-to-date plans off various websites. Instead, he decided to design his own unique tear drop. "Most of the designs are for 4-by-8-foot trailers; I wanted to make mine larger — 5-by-10," he said. "I took different person's ideas and I took pictures of other tear drops and scaled them like an engineer."

Unlike most tear drops, Lohman's design has a 10-foot front curvature rather than the traditional 8 feet. He incorporated entrance doors on each side "so people would not have to climb over each other all of the time." To transfer his design to full size, Lohman fabricated a 12.5-foot compass to draw the front and back side curvatures on two pieces of Masonite screwed together. The template then was used to cut out the side shapes out of large sheets of half inch plywood. The frame was fabricated from 2-inch steel tubing, while the axle was purchased from a local farm supply store and cut down to size.

The actual trailer is all wood with every seam reinforced with Gorilla Glue. The trailer is attached to the frame using dozens of carriage bolts. The exterior is sheathed with the same kind of aluminum used for semi-trailer roofs that Lohman purchased from Hudsonville Trailers. The interior has wood paneling backed by foam insulation. The living quarters includes a full-size bed and 12-volt lighting. The trailer also has hook-ups for 110-volts when parked at a campground. It weighs in at 1,200 pounds. "There is plenty of room for two to sleep in there. If you really like each other, it can

sleep three," he said.

The galley area has cabinets for food storage, a propane stove, a cooler and space for a large jug of water. Lohman completed the trailer about three years ago and used it for a two-week trip three years ago on Route 66.

Lohman's trailer is so popular that he has fielded several requests to build one for others. "I may consider building one a year once I retire, but they'll be smaller and not as complex as mine," he said. "I'm just going to have fun with mine for the time being."


