From the President

This year marks the celebration of an anniversary, actually a few anniversaries. There are those of us that celebrate a birthday anniversary every year, a wedding anniversary every year and I am sure a few other anniversaries are celebrated because they become a reason to party. This year has a couple of special



anniversary celebrations. This year is the 50th anniversary of a fabulous car which just happens to be a Studebaker. Yes, it is the big FIVE-0 for Avanti. 50 years ago the Studebaker board was ready to call it quits in the car world and go in the direction of their other interests in the form of a mini conglomeration minus automobiles. They hired a new president, Sherwood Harry Egbert, and felt that without his background in automobiles he would build upon on the company's early success in diversification. Instead Egbert recognized the company needed a star to brightly shine. It needed a halo car. He realized a "new" car would have to be something dramatically styled and built at a minimal cost. He hired Raymond Loewy and they were like, Gentlemen, Start Your Engines, off to demonstrate Studebaker's capabilities. Tight, short time frames, lack of funds for new parts and new concepts like working with fiberglass all came into play but alas the Avanti was born. From concept drawings to a full size model scheduled for production took just six weeks. Then there was a near impossible schedule set to introduce the Studebaker Avanti, in one year, simultaneously at the Studebaker shareholders' meeting in South Bend, Ind., and at the New York Auto Show. In April 1962 the new car sat under a banner reading "A New Star is Born." Studebaker had pulled off the impossible and arrived on schedule. 50 years later it is a lasting remembrance of a company willing to take chances and think outside the proverbial box.

Another anniversary that is setting a milestone this year is the Studebakers Drivers Club, Grand Canyon State Chapter, as it celebrates 40 years in existence. There are many memories made throughout forty years of existence and many lessons learned. Owning a Studebaker is like celebrating an anniversary every year. You love the brand for the unique style, the advanced thinking, the all the time leaks and frustrations, and the 'I know what's wrong, and if I could find it, I'd fix it' mode we find ourselves in. They say love is blind but if that is true why did they make so many eye pleasing models of Studebaker? An anniversary in a marriage is labeled as to how many years it has lasted like leather, iron, copper, tin, and steel. It appears to me that they were talking about being married to a Studebaker.

Anniversaries are for remembering and my memories include the thrill of driving my first Avanti. I remember that you never really learn to swear until you start being influenced by the ownership on an old car. I


UPCOMING EVENTS



- Roadrunners are not just in cartoons! In Arizona, you'll see them running up to 17-mph away from their enemies.
- The Saguaro cactus is the largest cactus found in the U.S. It can grow as high as a five-story building and is native to the Sonoran Desert, which stretches across southern Arizona.
- Sandra Day O'Connor, the first woman appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court, grew up on a large family ranch near Duncan, Arizona.
- The best-preserved meteor crater in the world is located near Winslow, Arizona.
- The average state elevation is 4,000 feet.
- The Navajo Nation spans 27,000 square miles across the states of Utah, Arizona and New Mexico, but its capital is seated in Window Rock, Arizona.
- The amount of copper utilized to make the copper dome atop Arizona's Capitol building is equivalent to the amount used in 4.8 million pennies.
- Near Yuma, the Colorado River's elevation dips to 70 feet above sea level, making it the lowest point in the state.
- The geographic center of Arizona is 55 miles southeast of Prescott near the community of Mayer.
- You could pile four 1,300-foot skyscrapers on top of each other and they still would not reach the rim of the Grand Canyon.
- The hottest temperature recorded in Arizona was 128 degrees at Lake Havasu City on June 29, 1994.

TECHNICAL INFORMATION

Tail Light Illumination

By Ernie Loga

Are your taillights dull or not as bright as you like them? Check the ground. The ground is usually the culprit in 6-volt systems. Another problem can be the size and condition of the wire feeding the bulb. Check the specifications in a Shop Manual Wiring Diagram for your car to make sure the gauge of wire is correct.

In my 1951 Commander the backing plate was white but didn't reflect as it should. I used plastic mirror material that I cut and stuck to the lamp backing right behind the bulb. It is a product marketed by CIPA USA Inc, Port Huron, MI 48050. It is a a "Cut and Stick" replacement that is 7 inches by 10 inches and cuts easily with scissors. It works better than any paint or coating. I've been able to find this product at Wal-Mart and K-Mart.

There is also a new product available on the market in the form of LED taillight bulbs. They make them in both 6-volt and 12-volt. When you use them you might have to modify your bulb holder so the face of the LED bulb shines straight out.


