
25th Annual Route 66 Fun Run

The Graingers and the Wests met in Seligman Friday evening at the pizza party in the motel restaurant. The Graingers' Studebakers were in protest and had problems, forcing them to drive a "Brand X". Our '66 Daytona was the chapter's only Studebaker as far as we know. There were several other Studes on the run from Nevada and California.

We traveled together in convoy Saturday investigating some of the places of interest along the old road and taking many pictures. Once in Kingman everyone went in different directions. The Graingers were spending the night and continuing the event Sunday, traveling into Oatman (to visit the burros that run wild) and then on to Topock, the end of the event. We went to the car show downtown and then drove the Daytona home on Saturday night so that we could attend the Railroad Park meeting on Sunday.

This was our 23rd time attending this event (somehow we missed the first 2 runs) and each year is different. Between 800 to 1000 cars from all over the world drive this old highway for the event, making it the largest rolling car show we know of. It's a 3 day event, but that can be cut to 2 days if you drive to Seligman on Saturday morning.





February was a special month for those of us who live in Arizona. Happy 100th Birthday, Arizona!

- The coldest temperature recorded in Arizona was 40 degrees below zero at Hawley Lake on January 7, 1971.
- A saguaro cactus can store up to nine tons of water.
- The state of Massachusetts could fit inside Maricopa County (9,922 sq. miles).
- The westernmost battle of the Civil War was fought at Picacho Pass on April 15, 1862 near Picacho Peak in Pinal County.
- There are 11.2 million acres of National Forest in Arizona, and one-fourth of the state forested.
- Wyatt Earp was neither the town marshal nor the sheriff in Tombstone at the time of the shoot-out at the O.K. Corral. His brother Virgil was the town marshal.
- On June 6, 1936, the first barrel of tequila produced in the United States rolled off the production line in Nogales, Arizona.
- The Sonoran Desert is the most biologically diverse desert in North America.
- Bisbee is the Nation's southernmost mile-high city.
- The two largest manmade lakes in the U.S. are Lake Mead and Lake Powell—both located in Arizona.
- The longest remaining intact section of Route 66 can be found in Arizona and runs from Seligman to Topock, a total of 157 unbroken miles.
- The 13 stripes on the Arizona flag represent the 13 original colonies of the United States.
- The negotiations for Geronimo's final surrender took place in Skeleton Canyon, near present day Douglas, Arizona, in 1886.
- Prescott, Arizona is home to the world's oldest rodeo, and Payson, Arizona is home to the world's oldest continuous rodeo—both of which date back to the 1880s
- Kartchner Caverns, near Benson, Arizona, is a massive limestone cave with 13,000 feet of passages, two rooms as long as football fields, and one of the world's longest soda straw stalactites: measuring 21 feet 3 inches.

ALL THE BELLS AND WHISTLES

n the 50s and 60s, if a car came with quite a few options, the car dealer would tell the customer the car comes with "All the Bells and Whistles". I have yet to see a car come from the factory with a bell or whistle, until now.

In 1924, the Studebaker EK Big Six could be or-

dered with a whistle in addition to the horn that is common on most automobiles. As I have mentioned in a previous article a friend of mine in Minnesota




purchased an EK Big Six a couple of years ago and is still trying to get it on the road. This process should progress at a little faster rate now that he retired in February.



The whistle was mounted on the dash just to the left of the steering wheel and operated using a vacuum line from the engine via the fuel tank at the rear of the car. Wonderfully, it would indicate "whistle' when there was three gallons of fuel left in the tank.

It sounds like Studebaker was first again with an

option that is quite common on the cars of today.




