
Studebakers Are Great. Studebaker People Are The Greatest!

TECHNICAL INFORMATION My New Tools

f you like tools as much as I do, you might be interested in some wrenches that are new to me. In January, with

Christmas money, I purchased a set of combination wrenches that I really like and would recommend to others. They are Craftsman "Cross Force" wrenches. The uniqueness of them is that they have a 90 degree rotation between the ends such



that when applying force to loosen (or tighten) a nut or bolt, you are always applying that force to a flat side. More force can be applied and with greater comfort. I haven't used a regular combination wrench since I got the Cross Force set.

Baked Simple Meatball Stroganoff

1/3 cup chopped green onions

1/4 cup seasoned bread crumbs

3 tablespoons grated parmesan cheese

1 lb ground beef or turkey

1 loaf (1 lb) Italian bread, cut in 1 inch slices

1 package 8 oz cream cheese, softened

½ cup mayonnaise

1 tsp Italian seasoning

1/4 tsp pepper

2 cups (8oz) shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese

3 ½ cups spaghetti sauce

1 cup water

2 garlic cloves, minced

Directions:

In a large bowl, combine the onions, bread crumbs and Parmesan cheese. Crumble the meat over mixture and mix well. Shape into 1 inch balls; place on a greased rack in a shallow baking pan. Bake at 400 degrees for 15-20 minutes or until no longer pink

Meanwhile, arrange bread in a single layer in an ungreased 13x9 in baking dish (all of the bread might not be used). Combine the cream cheese, mayonnaise, Italian seasonings and pepper; spread over the bread. Sprinkle with ½ cup mozzarella.

Combine the spaghetti sauce, water and garlic; add meatballs. Pour over cheese mixture; sprinkle with remaining cheese and bake, uncovered at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.



What!! There Were Five Sisters??

The Five Sisters of the Five Studebaker Brothers of South Bend

It's generally known among Studebaker vehicle enthusiasts that there were five brothers - Henry, Clement, John M., Peter and Jacob. All were heavily involved in the early years of the world-renown wagon and automobile company based in South Bend, Indiana for more than a century. But it's likely that few today know there were also five sisters born to the parents, John C. and Rebecca (Mohler) Studebaker. In keeping with the role of women in the 19th century, the lives of the Studebaker sisters - Sarah, Nancy, Elizabeth, Rebecca and Maria - followed paths quite different from that of their brothers and, to some extent, from each other. The three older sisters married and bore children; the two younger sisters did neither. What was their lot in life?


Information published in the volumes of The Studebaker Family in America on SARAH, eldest of the five sisters, was skimpy and flawed. New research by this author has unearthed details of her life largely in Elkhart County, Indiana with husband Philip Welch and their three children that lived to adulthood. Sarah's descendants have the surnames Galentine, Kaiser, Miner, Morgan, Violett and Welch. In addition to multiple spouses, the marriage of two of Sarah's descendants, one to a descendant of her sister Elizabeth and one to a member of the Violett family, presented a complex "Marriage Puzzle."

Details of second-born sister NANCY, husband John Lucas and the first of their three children remain sketchy due to the early deaths of all three. However, new research on the two Lucas siblings that survived has uncovered much of interest about the lives of daughter Emma and son Sylvester. Emma married in the Dansard family of bankers in Monroe, Michigan. Sylvester worked for the Studebaker company in South Bend, but had three sons who became medical professionals in South Bend and Chicago.

The noteworthy lives of third-born sister ELIZABETH, her husband Rev. George Witwere, and the twelve children born to them have been well documented by past and present biographers. In addition to the many descendants with the Witwer surname, their seven successful sons and three daughters provided other descendants with the surnames of Fernandez, Housholder, Kopcsay, Lippincott, McLeish, Mild, Mohler, Morgan, Nott, Pierson, Sell, Shade, Shekerjian, Stolz, Sutton, Thomson, Worth and Wysong. In addition to multiple souses, the marriage of two of Elizabeth's descendants, one to a descendant of her sister Sarah and one to a member of the Violett family, resulted in a complex "Marriage Puzzle."

Younger sisters REBECCA and MARIA did not marry, but lived out their lives together in the Studebaker family home at 601 LaSalle street in South Bend, Indiana. Contemporary South Bend newspaper articles indicate that both sisters were active in the local community and were involved in efforts to help those less fortunate.

Politics at its finest, the battle continues

I recently came across a photograph of a 1930s "service" station that is selling gasoline blended with ethanol. This photograph lead me to research its development and use in America. There is quite a bit of information on the web. I chose to provide a condensed listing of the timeline offered by Wikipedia.

- 1896, gasoline is cheap and abundant, and ethanol is taxed at a high level. Automakers design cars to operate on gasoline.
- 1906, the ethanol tax is repealed under Teddy Roosevelt's administration. Corn ethaol is now cheaper than gasoline.
- 1908, the Ford Model T is fitted with a carburetor that will run on gasoline or ethanol.
- 1914, the regulatory burden on ethanol is again decreased.
- 1918, Scientific American says it is "now definitely established that alcohol can be blended with gasoline to make a suitable fuel..." It is also noted that 10 gallons of ethanol can be produced from a ton of seaweed.
- 1919, with the prohibition of beverage alcohol, the industry turns to ethanol for an outlet for its product.
- 1921, leaded gasoline is developed at the General Motors research laboratory in Dayton, Ohio.
- 1923, leaded gasoline is marketed; and in 1924 GM claims that the problem of "engine knock" has been solved. By the mid-1920s ethanol is blended with gasoline in every industrialized nation of he world. Public health officials are appalled at the prospect of lead poisoning and demand that ethanol blends continue.
- 1924, GM nearly abandons leaded gasoline after a terrible refinery accident injures and kills dozens.
- 1925, Henry Ford tells the New York Times that ethyl alcohol is the fuel of the future.
- 1926, the Public Health Service allows leaded gasoline to return to the market.
- 1930s, The Dust Bowl influences Henry Ford to again state the importance of ethanol fuels.
- 1933, the American Petroleum Institute initiates a campaign against the use of ethanol with the end of Prohibition.
- 1937, the farm chemurgical movement spurs the use of ethanol blends at 2,000 service stations throughout the Midwest (see photo below)..
- 1964, a seven car crash at the Indianapolis 500 results in the banning of gasoline use for 41 yeas. It was determined that alcohol based fuels were less likely to result in serious fires. The ban was lifted in 2005.
- 1971, The Nebraska Agricultural Products Industrial Utilization Committee is formed to find new uses for surplus grains.
- 1979, Jimmy Carter's administration creates incentives for ethanol production.
- In the late 1980s and 1990s the price of a barrel of oil drops to \$12, causing the developing ethanol industry to go bankrupt.
- 1988, There is a push by President Bush's administration to cleanup air e benzene from gasoline fuels. This sets the stage for the 1990 Clean Air Act.
- 2003, California is the first state to outlaw MTBE. Other states followed.
- 2007, the United Nations urges a five-year ban on biofuels.

Where are we today? Go to your local filling station (no longer a service station) and fill-er-up with the seasonal blend and hope your Studebaker will take you to the movie "The Promised Land; and don't forget your fuel stabilizer.
