Your history as a Studebaker owner and driver is also important and our readers would like to hear about it. Put something down on a piece of paper or e-mail and send it to me.



As of 3/28/14 the Chapter has \$4783.83 in Checking and \$5312.71 in Money Market.

CHANGING OIL IN YOUR STUDEBAKER By Malcolm Berry

When you are changing the oil in your Studebaker, it's always a good idea to get the engine fully warmed up before you drain the old oil. Every time you change the oil, you need to replace the oil filter also. If your Studebaker is a late 1962, 1963 or 1964 model, it has a spin-on type oil filter. It's a good idea to punch a small hole in the bottom of the old filter. This will let the oil drain out without making such a mess. When the oil is drained out of the old filter, unscrew the filter and replace it with a new filter. I like to fill the new oil filter with oil before I install it so that the engine does not run dry for a few seconds.

Another type of oil filter is one mounted on the top of the engine. To change the filer, remove the top, pull out the filter and remove the dirty oil. Be sure to wipe the inside of the housing clean before you install the new filter and replace the top. For either type of filter that you have, once you add the proper amount of new oil, make sure you start the engine and check for leaks around the filter. After the engine has run for a few minutes, shut the engine off and recheck the oil level.

Most oil on the market is not good for older cars. When buying oil, make sure you buy oil that is specifically for older cars. The brand I use is Brad Penn Oil.

THE WEASEL

n December 7, 1941 Japan gave cause for the United States to get into WWII. Studebaker had already been building trucks for European countries but now it became a real military style truck. Then came the building of Studebaker built Wrights Cyclone R-1820 engines used mainly in the B-17 Flying Fortress bombers. There was an Englishman, Geoffrey Nathaniel Pyke, who was pushing for a vehicle that could be used in the snow that covered Europe during the winter months. Colonel Dwight David Eisenhower was in charge of the War Plans Division in the U.S. and on April 11, 1942

got the push to produce a snow machine approved. Studebaker still had some room in their factories and design engineers with time to do the job. On May 17, 1942 Studebaker was given the challenge to design and build such a vehicle. It took 34 days and two prototypes were built. They used the 170ci Champion engine with a 12 volt electrical system in the rear. In testing it was found that the weight in the rear caused it to dig in when going up a hill, so the motor

was moved to the front. They also had a problem of throwing off the tracks, so they went to 32 boogie wheels instead of 16 (boogie wheels are those little wheels the tracks ride on). Many more changes were made and it was ready to go. About 1000 model T23/M29s started coming off the production line in late summer. Because these units could go over

any type of land (swampy, sand and snow) they got named "Weasel". Only seven months from the start a water version was built on December 17, 1942 and by July of 1943 the model M29C amphibious Weasel was in production. Another thing of interest, they had seat belts on all seats.

The three different books I found that gave information about the Weasel have a 10,000 units produced difference. Two of the books list 15.124 units built while the other book says 25.124 units built. The war was getting near the end and the war department gave the auto industry the green light to start building cars on July 1, 1945 but Studebaker was still building the Weasel by contract until August 1945. There are reports of Weasels still being used in the 1980s and the Army used them into the 1950s which would put some of them in Korea.

None of the books mention Weasels being built in Dover, Delaware but a tour is listed for Tuesday during the International SDC meet that includes where the Weasels were built. I'll have to go Horn, Iowa. Visit http://www.libertyar.com/ for and find out about that.


