Technical Information

Diagnosing Play in Steering Column

f you notice excessive play in your steering wheel, this could be caused by several things. One of the most common causes is play in the bell crank assembly. Either the bearings are worn or the pinch bolt is loose. How you determine this is to have someone move the steering wheel back and forth while another person looks underneath the car and watches the bell crank assembly. If it is worn, you can easily see the up and down movement. It's a common problem that the bearings are worn out because putting grease in the fitting in this unit is commonly overlooked.

To repair this, you must remove the bell crank assembly and replace the bearings and bell crank shaft. These parts are readily available from any Studebaker parts supplier.

The repair of this unit is listed in the Studebaker Shop Manual under "Steering Linkage".

Adult Admission is \$8 for adults, \$3 for ages 5 to 12; children under age five are admitted free along with anyone that has a Parks pass.

Let's have a pot luck so bring a dish to share and the meat of choice. We will have a gas grill to utilize and we can use the tables in the picnic area. Trails are Wheelchair Accessible. It is pet friendly.


Take a look at what the Arboretum has to offer.

Garden Information: The Hummingbird-Butterfly Garden is the first specialized collection visitors encounter along the main trail; others include the Desert Legume Garden, Cactus Garden, Curandero Trail, Wing Memorial Herb Garden, Eucalyptus Forest and Demonstration Garden. **Plant Information:** 3,200 different desert plants are encompassed within the arboretum, from A to Z. Most can be seen along the 1.5 mile main trail.

Animal Information: A ground squirrel hops across your path, a Harris Hawk lands on a saguaro limb, a lizard does "pushups" to expose his blue abdomen from a prominent rock. More than 230 bird and 72 terrestrial species have been tallied over the years as both permanent and migratory Arboretum residents.

Desert Information: Visitors are surprised to learn that Boyce Thompson Arboretum is more than a collection of Sonoran Desert species. Learn more about our African, South American, Asian and Mediterranean collections.

50th International SDC Meet in Dover, Delaware

During the week of June 29th through July 5th, the Studebaker Drivers Club held its 50th International meet in Dover, Delaware at the Dover Downs Hotel & Casino. The meet, which was hosted by the DelMarVa Chapter, was quite an undertaking for one of the newest and smallest SDC chapters but they did a great job of organizing and executing the event.

The area is replete in attractions and the tours were evidence of all that could be visited in the area including our nation's capital, QVC Network Studios, the NASA Space Flight Center and beaches among many more. Driving tours were also scheduled including one to the WWII Weasel Factory.

Seminars abounded, too, with the usual ones for members wanting to have their cars judged as well as for those interested in judging, both conducted by the chief judge and our chapter president, Ed Smith.

Many attended meetings held throughout the week including ones for the SDC board, newsletter editors, chapter presidents and the Studebaker National Foundation.

And for many, the focus of the meet was the swap meet and there was plenty to see with the banquet room completely filled with vendors selling new old stock, reproduction and used parts. In addition, the parking lot just outside the indoor vending area had more vendors with lots of goodies.

The highlight of the meet was, of course, the concours on Thursday when 255 Studebaker and Avantis were presented on a grass field to the delight of the participants with about another 90 vehicles in the parking lot. Approximately 129 were judged of which several achieved perfect 400 point scores.

Among chapter members attending, Malcolm Stinson and Ken Michael were the only ones to have their vehicles judged. Congratulations to both on earning first place awards in their classes. John Rodhouse's parents, Jack and Kathy from Massachusetts, entered two Avantis and one earned a first and the other a second. Congrats to them, as well. Some of you may recall they helped John with judging at our Zone Meet last October.

Arizona members earning awards in other areas were June Kaiser, a second in senior by-monthly newsletter competition, and Frank Wenzel and Chuck Collins both earned first place awards in the South Bend/ Studebaker watch judging. Colin Fort and Larry Swanson were recognized for their many years of service to SDC.

A special mention was made at the awards banquet that David Dowd drove the same car to this meet as he drove to the first SDC meet fifty years ago. Another recognition made at the banquet was the longest distance driven in a Studebaker which went to Carl and Herman Thoms of Redwood City, Calif. who drove their 1951 Commander over 3,000 miles to attend the meet.

The 2015 meet will be held in St. Louis, Missouri August 16th - August 22nd.

t is with sadness we report the passing of Dick Leisinger, a chapter member who had a passion for Studebakers and drove his 1962 GT Hawk often. At 85 years of age, he was very active in the car hobby, particularly in Prescott, but he would drive down frequently for valley chapter events.

Studebaker Myths and Misconceptions

Studebakers have not been made since 1966. Over the passing years many myths and misconceptions have persisted. Here are ten myths that are often repeated and the facts to hopefully set the record straight once and for all.

Myth #1: Studebaker was owned/made by Hudson/ AMC/Ford/Chrysler, etc.

Fact: From 1852 through 1966, 1954-1962 were the only years in which Studebaker was a division of a larger corporation. The Packard Motor Car Company purchased The Studebaker Corporation in 1954 and formed The Studebaker-Packard Corporation. That company manufactured both Packard and Studebaker automobiles and trucks through the 1958 model year, when Packard production ceased. The Corporation dropped Packard from the name in 1962 and became The Studebaker Corporation until Studebaker automobile production was terminated during the 1966 model year. Myth #2: Studebaker V-8 motors were designed and/ or made by Ford/Cadillac/AMC/Chevy, etc.

Fact: Studebaker designed, cast, machined and built its own V-8 motors beginning in the 1951 model year through 1964. The Studebaker 289 c.i. V-8 was introduced in the 1956 model year, seven years before Ford introduced their 289 during the 1963 model year. It is true that a Cadillac intake manifold can be modified to fit a Studebaker V-8 but there were no ties between the Cadillac Division and Studebaker. For the 1965-66 model years only, all Studebakers were manufactured in its Hamilton, Ontario, Canada plant with V-8s and sixes sourced from General Motors' McKinnon Industries engine plant.

Myth #3: The famous 1953 Studebaker Starlight (not starlite) coupe and Starliner hardtop were designed by Raymond Loewy.

Fact: The actual designing of the '53 Studebaker was done by Bob Bourke, who worked for the Raymond Loewy design firm.

Myth #4 : The Avanti was made in Canada.

Fact: Avantis were never built in Canada. 1963 and 1964 Avantis were built at the Studebaker plant in South Bend, Indiana. After Studebaker closed its South Bend (US) manufacturing, the Avanti (name, molds, parts, etc.) was sold to private individuals who produced the Avanti II and other Avanti configurations. The post-Studebaker Avantis are not officially "Studebakers", but the cars and their owners are welcomed and appreciated by the Studebaker Drivers Club. More Avanti facts: www.aoai.org

Myth #5: My (buddy/relative) had a 1955 Golden Hawk (or 1961 Silver Hawk).

Fact: Golden Hawks were ONLY produced in '56, '57 and '58. The '56 G.H. had a Packard 352 V-8 engine (but never supercharged and never with two 4 bbl carbs). '57 and '58 G.H. had a McCulloch supercharged 289 c.i. Studebaker V -8. Other '56 Hawks included Sky Hawk, Power Hawk and Flight Hawk. Silver Hawks were ONLY produced in '57, '58

and '59. All 1960 and 1961 Hawks were simply Hawks, with no other identifiers. '62-'64 had the Gran Turismo Hawk (not Grand Torino, which was a Ford). '63-'64 GT Hawks could be ordered with a Paxton supercharged engine.

Myth #6: Parts for Studebakers are impossible to get. Fact: Of course, there are a few exceptions but by and large, parts are plentiful and easy to get from a large number of Studebaker parts vendors. For NOS, used and reproduction parts sources visit www.studebakervendors.com

Myth #7: Studebakers were built with flathead 6 cyl. engines for Grandpas and Grandmas.

Fact: Studebaker was famous for its economical sixes BUT Studebaker also built a number of sporty and HIGH-PERFORMANCE cars. Powerful, stock-block Studebaker straight eights competed favorably in The Indianapolis 500 Mile Race during the 1930s. The 1953 coupe has been declared a work of art. In 1955, it was the sporty Speedster, and then became the basis for the entire Hawk line through the 1964 model year. High-performance R-1, R-2, R-3 and R-4 Avanti engines that could be (and were) factory available in any Studebaker car model in '63 and '64, as were 4-speed transmissions. The Avanti was famous on the Bonneville Salt Flats and Ted Harbit and his '51 Studepowered "Chicken Hawk" is a 7-time NRHA champion and a member of the NHRA Hall of Fame.
