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From the President

Did you know there is only one archaeological site in the U.S. that you can dig for artifacts and have them named after you? That's right, it is at the Little Bear Ruins on the X Diamond Ranch near



Greer. Also in Greer is the Butterfly Museum (only named that way because of so many butterflies in the area), the home of a father and son that found inspiration in this mountain village. As a writer and painter they fashioned words, paintings and sculptures to depict the mystery and adventure of the White Man and Indian spirits of the old West. Some older cars perform and ride better that newer ones. If you drive one you will buy one. These things I learned on a recent outing with the Antique Club to Show Low.

Now, do you know what bird has foot-long wing feathers, how old is a 6-foot high Saguaro, and can you name three desert plants with fruit, seeds or nuts at their edible peak in August?

The Boyce Thompson Arboretum is the place to see towering trees, captivating cacti, sheer mountain cliffs, a streamside forest, panoramic vistas, many natural habitats with varied wildlife, a desert lake, a hidden canyon,

specialty gardens, volcanic formations and to get answers to these questions. Come out and discover the intricate beauty and many faces of Arizona's oldest and largest botanical garden. Find out about the odonate species with names like the Blue-eyed



Darner, the Flame Skimmer or the Mexican Amberwing.

Get away from the noisy city life for a while and enjoy the soothing sound of a male Common Ground Dove cooing his soft territorial song or listen to the colorful orioles, tanagers and other late summer songbirds.

See if you can come close to finding all of the 44 species of "flowers on the wing" like the Empress Leilia, "Xami Hairstreak" or Spring Azure. Look for one of the tagged Monarchs.

Don't think of sitting around too long or one of the resident Turkey Vultures might mistake you for their next meal. There is the opportunity to get up close and personal with a real live Turkey Vulture and other birds, reptiles and mammals in a living exhibit.

Did you know that Pomegranates are reputed to be among antioxidant-packed "super foods" and they thrive in Arizona and in the Arboretum? Why do I mention this, you may ask? Well, they have a colorful background in literature and lore and could have been the fruit in the Garden of Eden. It has many culinary uses. Pomegranate juice can be very sweet or sour, but most fruits are moderate in taste, Pomegranate has been made into a liqueur and as a pomegranate eggplant relish, and avocado-pomegranate dip. It is also a popular fruit confection-

ery used as ice cream topping, mixed with yogurt, or spread as jam on toast.

The pomegranate has been used extensively in medicine. The rind of the fruit and the bark of the pome-

granate tree are used as a traditional remedy against diarrhea, dysentery, and intestinal parasites. The seeds and juice are considered a tonic for the heart and throat. Thus, pomegranate is considered a healthful counterbalance to a diet high in sweet-fatty components. Especially when sweet, pomegranate fruit is known as a blood builder. The astringent qualities of the flower juice, rind, and tree bark are considered valuable for a variety of purposes, such as



stopping nose bleeds and gum bleeds and toning skin. Pomegranate juice is also used as an eyedrop, as it is believed to slow the development of cataracts. They say that the pomegranate will firm-up sagging breasts, and treat hemorrhoids. Who could ever need that?

Pomegranate has been used as a contraceptive and abortifacient by means of consuming the seeds, or rind. This practice is recorded in ancient Indian literature, in medieval sources, and in modern folk medicine. Pomegranate extracts are used to treat intestinal parasite infestations. The seeds are excellent sources of dietary fiber. Could this be the fountain of youth?

With 323 acres there is plenty of room for lots of Studebakers and leaves room for exploring or just hanging out with your friends if you prefer. Either way you will get your money's worth.

Drive your Studebaker, bring a dish to share, meat to BBQ and come out and see the native plants that have fed, healed and clothed Sonoran desert peoples for more than one thousand years.

STUDEBAKER SUMMER ON THE MOGOLLON RIM

Most of us loyal Arizona Studebaker enthusiasts don't think of summertime as being a good time to cruise our wheels. After all, most of us live in the hot desert, and August is usually the worst time to tax the radiators on our favorite South Bend products. But this year we were given a special option. This year's Antique Studebaker monthly meeting was hosted by our favorite Studebaker Marine, Malcolm Stinson. Now, Malcolm really knows how to put on great meetings.

This meet was a three-day affair from Friday night to Sunday morning, August 15 - 17. Driving from the hot desert heat to the Mogollon Rim was an eventful day on Friday for most of us. With the monsoon being in full-swing, mother nature put on a grand display of cumulus clouds (we call them fluffies) against a vivid blue sky. The summertime storms developed early, washing our Studebakers as we drove. Just the sight of all this was very cooling and refreshing. Our overnighting was hosted in two locations; those with RV accommodations stayed at Malcolm's Studebaker Ranch, everyone else bunked at the K-C Motel in downtown Show Low.

The first event was Friday night at 5PM (1700 hours) sharp. Fifty or more of us descended on the Cattleman's Steakhouse at the corner of Routes 60, 77 and 260 in downtown Show Low. The food was excellent and the fellowship even better. Although this was a meet for the Antique Studebaker Club, Arizona Chapter, many of our 'modern' Studebaker friends from the Southern Arizona and Grand Canyon State Chapters were also enjoying the refreshing 6,500 foot elevation. After dinner we were all on are own to sit up late, catching up with old friends and welcoming new folks in the group.

Since it was Malcolm's organization we were called to assembly Saturday morning at Marine time, 0730 sharp. The location was Sal and Teresa's Mexican Restaurant, located in the huge Cal-Ranch parking lot, a good place to assemble and display cars. It is located on the Duece of Clubs Hiway 60/260. After breakfast we assembled and kicked tires. We also were able to see Alan and Mary Travis' prize car. It is the oldest American car, a 1898 Jeanperrin. Watch for future information about the exploits of this car in England.

At 0900 sharp we were ready to roll on our first tour when the first car-casualty of the day occurred. Joe Bailey's 1941 Champion was loosing air around the valve stem of one tire. With all the available help, that only slowed down the departure time five minutes. Malcolm lined us up in antique order, placing the pre-war cars in the front of the proces-



sion. Saturday was another Arizona Chamber of Commerce monsoon summer day. We had a beautiful sky with lots of cumulus clouds, but very little rain on our all day parade. We toured on Route 77 through Pinetop/Lakeside, past the Hondah Casino, and through McNary on the White Mountain Apache Reservation. We passed up the Country Road 373 turn-off to Greer. Five miles further we turned off at Country Road 4124 to the X Diamond Ranch. This ranch was originally settled by Mormons, the Butlers, in the late 1800s. It is has remained in the original family until the present

day. These folks are the direct descendants of Molly Butler, a prominent name in that region. Two speakers told us of the ranch history and an ongoing archeological dig of ancient Indian ruins that were close by on the ranch. The upper Little Colorado River waters flowed passed the ranch just a stones throw from the museum and ranch buildings. There is nice trout fishing available for \$35.00 per day, catch and release only.

After leaving the ranch, we drove to Greer for lunch. We ate at the Molly Butler Lodge. (I believe we have heard that name before.) Greer also has one of the branches of the Little Colorado River flowing through it. We departed from Greer on our own, no longer driving in tour fashion. The rest of the afternoon we were free to explore on our own. That means that Sandie made me take her to Safeway in Show Low for her ritual afternoon Starbucks ice tea. Later in the afternoon we all began assembling at Malcolm's ranch for the big evening food treat, courtesy of Malcolm and several other contributors. There was much food and visiting. Malcolm's famous clam chowder was the lead menu item, with a big spread of other food delights and lots of desserts. Entertainment was supplied by Lou Fencl and his custom built hit and miss powered Maytag bicycle.

Sunday morning many of us met again at Sal and Teresa's Mexican Restaurant for breakfast and conversation. About 0930 Malcolm lined up the Studebaker train for a short ride to Bob and Stoddard's place just west of the town on Route 260. Bob is quite the handy-man-mechanic-craftsman. He hosted our group around his sizeable residence and shops, displaying over 50 'hit-and-miss' engines, numerous restored antique tractors, and two custom rods (one truck and one car) I believe this was the weekend highlight for Don Aden and Lou Fencl. After spending sometime at the Stoddard's we all departed for home.





A-1 Auto Salvage to hold auction, then close

Roswell, N.M., is the source of many secrets, one of which is among the hobby's best-kept secrets — A-1 Auto Salvage. That secret is coming to an end with the yard's closing and sale of its contents at auction on Sept. 20.

"The owner wants to get rid of everything that is on [that property] and close it down," explained yard manager Mario Silva. "The owner's main focus is recycling."

Rather than recycle the yard's 350-400 old cars, A -1 Auto Salvage & Recycling will offer its stash of prewar to 1970s cars, trucks and parts to collectors in a noreserve sale held on-site by Bill Johnston Auctioneers. Those cars not sold at auction will be crushed.

Silva said some of the cars have titles, but the staff is still sorting through the paperwork to determine which cars have them.

A full inventory has not yet been posted, but the yard has many of the solid New Mexico cars pictured on its Facebook page. A flip through these images reveals many 1956-1964 full-size Fords and four-seat Thunderbirds, Studebakers as old as 1940, Falcons galore, several mid-1950s Oldsmobiles, a couple 1957 Buick two-door hard-tops, many early Chevelles and 1960s Impalas, finned Imperial four-doors and a few Jeeps, including at least Jeepster convertibles. There are even first-generation Mustangs and a healthy smattering of trucks.

The yard's inventory of thousands of parts will be offered on pallets and includes many body panels. Silva said there also seems to be a surplus of Volkswagen parts, which correlates with the number of Beetles and Karmann Ghias in the yard's inventory.

TECHNICAL INFORMATION

If You're Not Hanging the Clothes Out, You Should By Dan Kuhl

September 13th is Drive Your Studebaker Day. I have driven mine every year since this "National Holiday" was founded. Here in Arizona it is still very hot making the drive not so desirable, and difficult for some of our Studebakers.

So, what do you do if you take your Studebaker out and it stops running because of vapor lock? One story I have heard uses a grapefruit wrapped around the fuel pump. In the recent issue of *Turning Wheels*, Randy Rundle suggests diesel fuel added to the gas tank. Or, if you have the urge to spend some real money, install an electric fuel pump in the car's fuel line.

My suggestion is inexpensive and very simple.

Go to the clothes line and steal a half dozen clothes pins. Place them in a ziplock bag for storage in the Studebaker's glove box. If it appears there is a vapor lock problem developing, simply attach the clothes pins to the fuel line between the fuel pump and carburetor, where ever the heating problem may exist.



At my last car show a California car owner swore by this method. Check the web. This method is discussed in detail. Good luck, and maybe I will see you on the road September 13th. Let the club know if you have favorable results with clothes pins. You know, its amazing how fast the clothes dry on the line in the summer.

WHAT'S IN A NAME? Dictator

While it may be hard to imagine today, there once was a time in America when the word "dictator" didn't conjure up any negative connotations. In 1927, in fact, the Studebaker Corporation thought the word so perfectly described their standing as an industry trendsetter — a car company that "dictated the standard" that other automobile makes would be obliged to follow — that they picked the word to rename one of their most popular models, known up to that point as the Standard Six.

Everything was going fine for the company until a very angry fascist named Adolph Hitler began terrorizing Europe. Car buyers over there, along with British Empire countries that imported the vehicle, suddenly became more than a little put off by anything having to do with dictatorships. In response, Studebaker decided to rename the car calling it the "Director" in any market that might be hypersensitive to a word connoting a murderous, warmongering ideologue bent on world domination.

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
