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
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From the President

Do you have the one that is pulled by the big Clydesdales? Do you have the first one ever built or the last one? Do you



Many people think that there has to be something special, eye stopping, strange or over the top before their vehicle is unique or special.

For instance, the 1939 Champion was special because it pulled the Studebaker Corporation out of receivership and doubled sales. During WWII, Studebaker made the US6 truck, engines for the B-17, and the unique Studebaker Weasel war time tracked vehicle, thusly Studebaker was ranked 28th in the value of wartime production contracts among US corporations. The post war vehicle design included the eye stopping 1947 Starlight Coupe. The flat back trunk design and wrap around rear window made people wonder if it was coming or going. Detroit's thinking was changed after Raymond Loewy's '53 low slung sports coupe, (one of the most impressive of modern cars) was introduced. A most intriguing new model of 1963 was the Lark Station Wagon with a slide-away roof panel and then there was the everlasting Hawk, and finally the Avanti, ahead of time and too late. All of these were special in one way or another.

Your Studebaker is special because it had major advances before other automobiles did like disc brakes. standard seat belts, a built in roll bar, a sun roofed station wagon, first to offer rear seat belts and Studebakers received design awards for years.

Not everyone who owns a Studebaker has one of these one of a kind features but everyone who owns a Studebaker has some uniqueness about the vehicle we drive. It might just be that you are the first and only owner or that is has exceptionally high or low mileage. Maybe it was the way it had to be modified or simply what happened during an adventure you had with it.

Your Studebaker is special because it is yours. It might not be the model that all people like or a color that stands out but it is yours. You have a Studebaker that is different from others because you have put you into it.

Bring your uniquely yours Studebaker out to the March Madness event at South Mountain and take home an out of the ordinary designed and built fun award.

FUN JUDGING - You still have time to plan and make an award for fun judging at the meet. Use your imagination to make a fun award such as these that were given in the past: Best Color Scheme or Hub Caps or Speedometer or The Money Pit or Slowest Studebaker. There are many more ideas like this that can be used as inspiration for an award. On show day you look at all the Studebakers on display and decide which one best fits your award. In the afternoon there will be an awards presentation when you will present the award.

- 4. Dimensions may be no longer than 12" high or 12" wide
- 5. No sharp edges or sharp protrusions on the racer.
- 6. Must be gravity powered. Absolutely no other power source allowed.

You can also bring a pinewood derby creation; kits are available at a Boy Scout or hobby store.



A South Bend Truck Partner

The year is 1920; the place is South Bend, Indiana. Edwards Iron Works (EIW) is organized into a company. Much like the Studebaker Manufacturing Company, EIW is a family concern. It is started by W. Howard Edwards, President, and his brother James E. Edwards, Treasurer. I.E. Edwards is Vice-president and F.E. Edwards is Secretary. The company begins in a small wooden structure as did the Studebakers 70 years earlier.

The plant, located at 2025 South Main, became one of the largest structural steel manufacturers in the Midwest. Early on, the business expands sufficiently that additional manufacturing facilities are needed. To accommodate the needed space the Edwards brothers agree the old family log cabin should be razed to make room for the expansion. The family's great-great grandfather had built the cabin in 1832.

The business continued to grow from a regional force to a national provider of steel products. In 1929 the company had to move to larger quarters eight blocks south of the old factory. At their new address EIW developed a close relationship with Studebaker. In 1930 Studebaker expanded their truck line. EIW furnished cabs, bodies, and special equipment for the Studebaker built trucks. Production of these truck parts complimented EIW's leadership in the existing business of manufacturing truck semi-trailers. Another significant happening in 1930 was the construction of Notre Dame Stadium. Under the direction of Knute Rockne, the "House That Rockne Built" was completed in six months with EIW providing much of the structural steel used in the project.

As with all industry, the 30's were a difficult time for Studebaker. In March, Studebaker went into receivership with a \$6,000 claim against the auto-maker by Edwards Iron Works. In December, Studebaker sought the services of W. Howard Edwards to manage the truck division, a position he filled until February 1936. Under his leadership, Studebaker released the popular cab-over-engine type truck that beat the competition to market by two to three years. In May 1936 the same Mr. Edwards bought out his brothers to form a new corporation.

Soon after this latest incorporation, EIW announced plans for a new travel trailer manufacturing facility located in



an old Oliver farm equipment building located on Walnut. Upon completion, the plant would be the largest factory in the world devoted entirely to the building of travel trailers. The new trailer would be known as the "Edwards Home-mobile". Ralph H. Wise was hired on as Chief Engineer; he came to EIW after designing the 1937 Hudson, International trucks, and the 1934-35 Studebaker trucks. Two years after starting the trailer business, it failed in 1938 with another down-turn in the economy. EIW continued to prosper in their other steel manufacturing activities. They continued to assist Studebaker on various projects. Most noteworthy was the mini-box used in the Champion coupe to convert it to 1/4 ton cargo carrying small truck. It was called the Coupe-Delivery and was manufactured from 1939 to 1941. The smallest truck offered by Stude-

baker in 1940 was the one-ton Fast Transport. As it had 10 years earlier EIW helped Studebaker fulfill its truck customer obligations.

Sadly, in 1951 Edwards Iron Works was purchased by COPCO Steel out of Detroit, Michigan. And as with Studebaker, the new owners were plagued with big corporation woes that included bouts with labor strife that continued into the 60's.
