



Thomas Edison is thought to have purchased the second one. The notion that Edison bought the second Studebaker Electric is unsubstantiated. He did however, own a Studebaker Electric and appears to have kept it for 23 years.

THE STUD IN STUDEBAKER

oon the winter season will be upon us. With it will often come the many hassles of trying to drive our cars under winter conditions.

I was recently reading a back issue of Hemming's "Classic Car Magazine" where I noticed a short article about Studebaker history. The article contained many of the usual contributions made by Studebaker over its long and colorful existence, and also contained one reference I was not familiar with, the studded tire that is legal in 39 states including Arizona.

When I was a kid, my Dad ran recapped snow-tires that contained sawdust on his '58 Ford. As noted on the web these snow-tires really did the job in snow country, but obviously didn't help much on ice.

In 1963 the Studebaker Corporation obtained the exclusive U.S. license for the production of the tungsten carbide tire stud. Under the StudeGrip Division, Studebaker became the first major producer of the tire stud in the United States. Dan Dobbins and his son, Richard, race their 1962 Lark Early growth during this period was amazing, growing from 24 on the ice in upper New York. They utilize studs in the million studs in 1964 to 275 million by 1966. Today studded tires for traction. Photo courtesy of Saabcentral.com tires are still in use, but have lost their favor to four wheel drive vehicles.

Lubricating a Studebaker


ecently Nora and I got a 2014 Fiesta to use mainly in her business. I call it a motorized beer can because of its small size but that is why we bought it. On the most recent tank of gas we achieved 41.9 mpg!

Nora's Mustang had to go away to help pay for the Fiesta. The Mustang had almost new tires (very close in size to the '37) so Frugal Fred decided to put the Mustang's tires on the '37. Since the '37 was on jack stands for the tire switcheroo I decided to go ahead and do an oil change. Imagine my surprise when I removed the add on bypass oil filter and found it to be dry!! Not only was the oil line from the side of the block to the filter plugged, but also the fitting on side of the block was plugged. After cleaning the line and fitting I finished the oil change and added a can of ZDDP to the oil. The EPA has forced oil companies to remove zinc from our modern oils. ZDDP provides the zinc to protect our OLD flat tappet engines. Cheap insurance!!

Now to the Studebaker lube jobs. I love grease zerks. One rule is to pump enough grease into the fitting so that new grease comes out the other end. I always clean the old grease up with paper towels so the grease won't be thrown on the bottom of the car or garage floor. Also I wear medical exam gloves, which keeps my hands clean, are cheap to purchase and can be disposed of easily. Some Studebaker differential housings have a grease zerk on each end to lube the rear wheel bearings. Studebaker started removing the zerk because gas station jockeys were pumping copious amounts of grease onto the brake linings. I can tell you from experience that grease packed brake linings will add excitement to your life! Check your owner's manual for the correct interval to lube your Stude. I think the 37 manual says 1000 miles for chassis lube and 10000 miles for rear wheel bearings.

In addition to greasing u-joints, driveshaft carrier bearings on cars with 2 piece drive shafts, parking brake cable housings, tie rod ends, steering linkage, center pivot pin, leaf spring shackles, suspension trunions, and kingpins, there might be a few other items needing lubrication. Many old starters have oil ports on the rear bushing. Generators have an oiler on each end. Distributors have an oiler or a grease cup. Many old water pumps have one or two grease zerks. Be very stingy with the grease on any water pump. I replaced my Commander 6 water pump with one that has a lifetime sealed full length bearing. Works Great! Be sure to check your owner's manual for a lube chart.

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
