
CHAPTER ELECTIONS

Last Ride in a Studebaker

Kelly Marion was a friend of Studebaker. We first met by phone over 27 years ago when he called me from Flagstaff about a car I had advertised in *Turning Wheels*. This was the first of many calls, meetings, breakfasts, lunches and dinners as well as Studebaker events and other events as well. When he would call, Jenny, my wife, would say it was Kelly on the phone ID and if I answered it, I would figure that I would set aside an hour to talk.

Kelly fell off a ladder on July 9, 2016 and passed away as a result of his injuries. I was contacted by Sean Marion about his last ride. The city of Flagstaff would not allow his ashes to be carried on a city vehicle so Sean asked if I could find a Studebaker that he could take his last ride. I contacted Ed Smith, Chris Collins, Bill Eastburn and Bruce Sandburg for assistance. I was given the name of Sam Powell and Lenka Hospodka who lived in Flagstaff. As things happen, Lenka told me that Kelly had sold them their 1955 President State over 25 years ago and they still had the car. Sam had repainted the car from the black and white color it was to a bright yellow and white. This car still has the original interior and everything was in tip top condition. They were very gracious and generously left the car for me, a complete stranger, at the motel we came to stay in Flagstaff.

Saturday morning we drove the President with Jenny following in our van to the church for the service. There were seven Fire Trucks and Rescue vehicles, some from as far away as Salt River and surrounding areas.

The service offered many tributes from family and friends then a slide show. One of the slides was the 1963 GT that I found in Cottonwood with Kelly just after he bought the car. There were other pictures as well with SDC Members and the various meetings that he attended.

After the service, I drove with Sean, Kelly's ashes in a red urn, with his mother, sister and cousin in the back seat. The President led the procession of Fire and Rescue vehicles and all the other vehicles from the church, which was near the Route 66 business loop, through the middle of town to the cemetery near the NAU campus.

Afterward, we said our goodbyes to Kelly and his family as we drove the family back to church for a reception. Jenny followed me back to the motel to leave the Studebaker for Sam to pick up.

Heartfelt thanks to Sam and Lenka and all the help offered and sympathy to the Marion family. Thank you to the Grand Canyon State Chapter for a donation in his memory to the Studebaker National Foundation.

Other memories include watching Fran Tarkenton take the Vikings to the Super Bowl, repeat episodes of Star Trek with the guys from eight floor, and commiserating with the same boys during the first draft number drawing for the Viet Nam War. Wouldn't it be nice if they would leave it up as a monument to all of the boys that became men in Stearns Hall?

In 1963 while I was perusing the model car kits for an Avanti in the Ben Franklin Department Store, Studebaker pulled the plug on its South Bend operation. Most of the cars and trucks we love would no longer be manufactured. Employees lost friends and jobs; they lost income and pensions; and more importantly, they lost a sense of worth and a future. In our corporate driven society, this kind of story continues to unfold all over America. To me, this is What Really Hurts.

Fixing the Elusive Shimmy

If your V8 Lark or Hawk with power steering has developed a very elusive shimmy and you have replaced everything in the steering and suspension that was even slightly loose and it didn't help, so you thought that the next step would be to balance the tires, switch tires from front to back, cuss out your favorite front alignment shop and still it didn't help, try this; The power steering is anchored to the frame ahead of the left front wheel. Check to see if the anchor has worked loose. If it is, tighten the bolts. If it is still loose, replace the two tapered rubber bushings that insulate the cylinder from the anchor.



Will unleaded fuel hurt our Studebaker engines?

ngines built before the early 1970s used leaded fuel and did not have hardened valve seats needed for unleaded fuel.

After tests were conducted by the U.S. Army, the Post Office and some large fleet operators (in the mid-70s) it was found that unleaded fuel did not cause a problem in vehicles that were not continuously operated over 3500 rpm or under heavy load (towing) conditions.

If you don't always drive at high speeds (over 3500 rpm) or do a lot of towing you should not have a problem with unleaded fuel in your Studebaker.

If you are rebuilding the heads on your Stude-baker, installing hardened valve seats is an option even though it's not a requirement.

If you are not rebuilding the heads and need lead, you can purchase an additive with lead for your fuel.

F.Y.I.... (if you didn't know already!) By Richie Fein

When I bought my Studebaker I sent a Cashier's Check for the amount of the sale, less the deposit. I sent a Cashier's Check thinking that the hold time on the check would be a shorter period than a personal check. Lo-and-behold this was not the case!

The seller's bank put an extended hold on the check because the amount was over \$5,000, even though his bank called my bank to verify the legality of the check and funds.

I called my banker and was told that this is an industry standard for checks over that amount. She advised me that in the future I should send multiple checks, all under \$5,000, to pay for a large purchase.

The seller's bank held the funds for two weeks. If I had known, the hold time would have been no longer than 5 days!

When I buy my fleet of 747 airplanes I will remember that.

In an attempt to beat the summer heat, Elaine and I drove to Colorado and spent a day in the lovely town of Ouray. While on a walking tour we stopped by the Beaumont Hotel. I noticed on the historic register this advertisement for Croft Brothers Studebaker. It had a phone number, but no address. I asked the clerk where this garage was, she had no idea, but she told us this was the original register from the 1920s.

We set out to locate the site of the garage, of course hoping to find some Studebaker relic that had survived.

Elaine went online and found an ad from the local paper from September 28, 1922, but there was still no address. We asked around until an old timer said the Museum would be able to help us. Sure enough, the guide at the Museum directed us to a book that listed George Croft as a prominent citizen of Ouray. In 1912, while he managed the Beaumont Hotel, he started a garage that he later turned over to his sons, Willard and Arthur, calling it Croft Brothers. It was also a "Studebaker agent" until 1932. It was located on the site of the current Ouray Chalet Motel, which just happened to be the place we had stayed the night before. So our summer get-a-way was cool in more ways than one.



THE HISTORY OF THE DELLS: The legacy of The Dells began 1.4 billion years ago with Precambrian granite protruding one to two miles from the valley floor into the West's bluest skies and brightest clouds. The imposing rock weathered to the rounded boulders and invariably fanciful outcrop-

pings enjoyed today. Nearly 100,000 early ancestors of the Yavapai Prescott Indian Tribe ("People of the Sun") and other native peoples are envisaged to have lived in the region 9,000 years ago. Local creeks and hand-made rock dams provided early irrigation to regional agrarian undertakings. Mining, rail-roading, farming and ranching nourished growth. Railroad track linked the area's commercial trade to city centers across the nation. The natural beauty, bountiful resources and recreational attributes of The Dells were treasured by locals long before beaver trappers and gold seekers spurred settlement in the early 1860s. The tall tales and folk lore of The Dells have been inextricably woven into Prescott's founding fabric, from legends of buried gold to recollections of watering holes and summer magic.
