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

About the Cover

n 1930. The Studebaker Corporation sponsored a Salesman's Christmas Gift Club and a salesman at a Studebaker dealership could earn points for sales of the various models. If he was a successful salesman, his family might find one of the items shown on the cover under the Christmas tree. In addition to the four shown, other items included a Duncan Phyfe table, a women's Bulova watch, Hamilton electric mantle clock, wool blanket among the approximately 35 items to choose from.

A whopping 30,629 points were needed for the combination rifle and shot gun but if fewer sales were made, only 6688 points would allow a pedal car to show up under the tree.

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From the President



We often find ourselves looking back and this year with the election has made us do that more than once. Many other older traditions have changed throughout the years also. Take, for instance, mincemeat pies. The pie is a remnant of a medieval tradition of a spiced meat dish. In Britain, eating mince pies at Christmas dates back to the 16th century. On Christmas Eve, children in the UK still leave out mince pies with brandy or some similar drink for Father Christmas and a carrot for the reindeer. It is still believed that to eat a mince pie on each of the Twelve Days of Christmas will bring 12 happy months in the year to follow. Now you know why the years seem to get rougher and rougher because who knows where to get mincemeat around here nowadays.

Another tradition that seems to have fallen from the top of the list is drinking Eggnog. The Eggnog drink may have developed from posset, a medieval European beverage made with hot milk that was curdled with wine or ale and flavored with spices. In the Middle Ages, posset was used as a remedy for colds and flu. Eggnog can suit about any person because it can be made to flavor coffee, latte, custard, or ice cream or mixed with distilled spirits such as brandy, gin, vodka, rum, tequila and whisky. Who doesn't like at least one of those? Why should it be just for holiday times?

Occurring every year at this time is a tradition with kids and toys. The toys may have changed but it still comes down to the kids and toys. In 1914, Charles Pajeau invented a new toy which attracted very little interest much to his displeasure. He tried something new and different. He hired several midgets, dressed them in elf costumes, put them in a department store window with his toy and wham, instant hit. The next year he sold over a million sets of Tinker Toys.

December 20, 1947, wanting to make the holidays a little happier for children, United States Marine Corps Reservist Major Bill Hendricks organized a toy drive for needy youngsters and thus Toys for Tots was created. The first Toys for Tots toy was a handmade doll by Diane Hendricks who passed away in 1988 at the age of 82 always remembered for what she created. Today, the Marine Toys for Tots continues to be a top charity. We should all buy some Tinker Toys and proceed, in our Studebakers, to Wickenburg on December 4th.

I look back at the last six years and say that I learned and had fun while doing so. Sometimes the burden of the most ordinary things could be made extraordinary simply by doing them with the right people. I have worked with some of the greatest people that helped in every way they could whenever they were asked no matter what the job. MUSCLE CAR AND CORVETTE NATIONAL

ast weekend (November 19-20) the annual MCACN show (Muscle Car and Corvette National) was held in suburban Chicago. This show is rapidly gaining attention as the Pebble Beach of the midwest. It is a showcase for all muscle cars and high end Corvettes. This year, there were a total of seven Avantis displayed plus two more Avanti powered Larks, for a total of nine Studebakers at this event. These included Ron Hall's Bonneville Avanti, the #8 Bonneville car



owned by Gary Wood, the #9 Bonneville car owned by John Hora; Randy Rapp's recently restored first production R3 Avanti; Ed George's R3 Avanti; Nelson Bove's R3 Lark; Eric DeRosa's R2 Lark; Lew Schucart's R1 Avanti and the recently built R4 clone, including an added supercharger, in a 1963 Avanti owned by John Batka.

This photo shows the Studebaker powered Avanti that Ron Hall built and drove on the Bonneville Salt Flats on September 22, 1993 to set a speed record of 200.426 MPH. This impressive display was in the main entrance of the event and is the result of the cooperative effort of AOAI, SDC, Michiana Chapter, SDC and the Chicagoland Avanti Owners chapter. Members of Chicagoland were on hand to assist in unloading, setting up and re-

loading the car in the SNM trailer. Numerous members of the Chicagoland chapter were on hand at all times during the show to hand out fliers and answer a lot of questions. We appreciate the united effort of these members who donated their time to make this Avanti showing a memorable event. With the approval of Luanne Hall, these members were responsible for securing Ron's Avanti from the Studebaker National Museum for this event.

As we are, Ron would be pleased to see his labors on display twenty-three years after setting the 200 mph record.

DOOR SAFETY LATCH


The door striker that is attached to the door post and covers the 1959 through '63 models and the 1965 & '66 (excluding the '64 models) incorporate a small flip latch that severs as a safety latch in case that the door does not latch securely.

Unfortunately, breakage of the safety latch is quite common on these models and it is caused by a person that is **NOT** holding the door handle button long enough for the rotary latch on the door to clear the safety latch. There is no cure for this other than reeducating of the person that is using the car door.

In 1964, Studebaker tried to solve this problem by removing the safety latch and redesigning the rotary door latch to incorporate a two stage locking action. This was an attempt to idiot-proof the door. It will work as long as the strikers are adjusted carefully but it generally requires slamming the door fairly hard, plus constant attention. Without this attention, the door will stay open.

This problem was too tough for Studebaker so they closed the plant down. Then, in 1965, they decided to let the Canadians have a bit of a go at the problem. They reverted to the earlier type striker with the safety latch plus some additional reinforcing. Owners of 1964 models can switch to the later reinforced strikers and owners of the earlier models can also use the later reinforced striker.

- ◆ On I-5 is Antique Powerland in Brook. The collection includes tractors, trains, and trollies as well as the usual old cars and trucks:

THE ARIZONA SHERIFF

GOOD MEN, PLUS GOOD ROADS, PLUS GOOD STUDEBAKERS UPHOLD LAW AND ORDER IN THE "COPPER STATE"

here are 14 counties in Arizona - glorious with scenic grandeur - thrilling with the romance of mountains and desert, of great rivers and pre-historic ruins. Indian pueblos contrast with modern cities. Vast ranches surround rich mines.

Arizona is notable, also, for the small number of its peace officers and for universal safety for life and property. Many an Arizona sheriff has jurisdiction over an area larger than some eastern states, but in every corner of Arizona laws are rigidly enforced. For this, of course, the character of men who hold the office of sheriff in Arizona is primarily responsible. But even the most fearless, aggressive, resourceful sheriff would be almost helpless without an automobile - and roads.

During the past eight years \$45,000,000 has been spent to give Arizona 2000 miles of state highways and 7000 miles of improved county highways. Thus gasoline enables a sheriff and two or three deputies to maintain the peace over vast areas which could not otherwise be controlled. Much of Arizona sheriff's life is spent in his auto. It is as important to him as his right arm.

Twelve of the 14 Arizona counties have supplied an automobile for the use of the sheriff. Every one of the twelve has bought a Studebaker.

When this story came to South Bend, The Studebaker Corporation commissioned Major Grover F. Sexton to visit each of these twelve sheriffs and see just what service Studebaker cars were rendering to the people of Arizona.

In each county Major Sexton gathered stories of adventure. During his stay at Prescott he was commissioned as deputy sheriff of Yavapai County and assisted in the capture of a criminal. At Yuma he accompanied the sheriff in a swift chase of bank robbers.

Stories of Arizona sheriffs - courage, their humor, their keen intelligence - as collected by Major Grover F. Sexton have been published in a booklet entitled "The Arizona Sheriff". Incidents picturesque, romantic, thrilling - explain how these soft-spoken, harddriving men with nimble guns keep the highways and byways of Arizona safe by swift and certain capture of wrongdoers.

In honor of the Arizona sheriffs who have made the Studebaker a vibrant symbol of law and order from the Grand Canyon to Old Mexico, the 5-passenger Big Six Duplex-Phaeton has been named "The Sheriff".

REMEMBERING CHUCK NAUGLE

"Wealth of information", "he was a good friend", "truly one of a kind". "pleasant memories", "wonderful collection of trucks", "a big loss to our club". These are just a few of the comments from those who knew Chuck Naugle after learning he passed away on November 25th at 85 years old.


