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## 1910 **Flanders Owner: Bob Lester**



#### Provenance

My father purchased this car for me in original condiand purchased this car for the into fightal total tion during the summer of 1956, when I was 14 years of age, from Ralph E. Lewis. Mr. Lewis owned a Studebaker dealership in Pontiac, Michigan. He bought the car for preservation sake and he was looking for a good home for it. Dad and I restored this car over a period of four years.

#### Features of this car

The Flanders "20" was designed to price compete with Henry Ford's Model "T" while offering upgraded features such as a selective gear transmission and more attractive styling, which included a "French Front Radiator" and a detachable rear seat.

The Flanders "20" has a 100 inch wheelbase, and a and a water cooled 156 cubic inch, 4 cylinder engine cast-in-block. Priced at \$750, it offered a 2 speed forward and reverse gear selective transmission located at the rear axle, called a transaxle. My car has been upgraded with a 3 speed forward transaxle.

The entire body is made of steel stampings, which was unique in 1910. The manufacturer, E-M-F purchased a stamping company which manufactured bath tubs and had a 2500 ton capacity stamping press, to produce all the body panels in-house. Another feature was that the Flanders engine and radiator were mounted on a modular sub-frame so that major engine repairs could be made in minimal time by swapping engine modules, if the engine in the shop had approximately the same hours of service as the vehicle with the engine problem there was no need to switch engines back.

#### About the Manufacturer

About the Manufacturer
Three men possessing complimentary skillsets joined together, secured financing, and formed the E-M-F
Company. E-M-F is an acronym for Everett, Metzger and Flanders. They were referred to as "The Big Three", and they were purported to have been even more wideyk known than Henry Ford was in their day. "Barney"
Everett, a successful carriage and automotive body manufacturer, was the top executive of the Wayne Automotive Company when he was 36 years old. William Metzger is arguably America's first automobile dealer, and initiator of automobile shows in the U.S.A. Walter Flanders initiated Henry Ford's mass production assembly process by rearranging machines, modifying production machines to perform multiple operations

simultaneously, and by introducing production scheduling. Walter Flanders actually practiced Just-in-Time production scheduling while working for Ford.

The E-M-F Company was born in 1908 at the site of the Wayne Automobile Company. The founders recognized that they needed to re-engineer the Wayne Automobile to allow them to become profitable in the intermediate price range they chose to compete for, and they decided to re-name their brand as E-M-F. E-M-F Automobiles were rated at 30 Horsepower and sold for \$1,250. Their objective was to produce a lot of car for the money.

As the E-M-F Company grew, other companies were brought into the fold, such as the Northern Motor Company, De-Luxe Motor Car Company, Western Malleable Steel & Forge, and the Monroe Body Company. Within 1 year of start-up E-M-F produced more cars than any other American car manufacturer, other than for Ford, and Buick. Also, E-M-F rapidly became the largest employer in Detroit, Michigan.

The Flanders "20" was introduced in 1910. The two-speed transaxle created a strain that often snapped rear axles so the next model year Flanders switched to a three-speed transaxle. Other than that, a few very mi-nor changes were introduced in the 1911 model year, but when the 1912 model year Flanders was rolled out, E-M-F claimed that they didn't know how to improve the Flanders "20", so that the 1912 version was identi-cal to the 1911's.

cal to the 1911's.

The E-M-F Company was profitable and the product enjoyed wide support of consumers, however, issues with their distributor the Studebaker Company put the fiscal health of the fledgling E-M-F Automotive Company in jeopardy. Legal battles between Studebaker and E-M-F followed until Studebaker surprised E-M-F with an offer to buy out the latter for a stunningly large dollar amount. The owners of the E-M-F Automobile Company accepted the offer. The sale of E-M-F to the newly reorganized Studebaker Corporation was underwrited by Goldman, Sachs & Company. Messer's Everett and Metzger left the organization immediately, but Walter Flanders stayed with Studebaker until lured away by another automotive venture.

## **Technical Information ......**Removing/Replacing Body Shims

By George Martens

This tip is for owners or people working a '53 thru '66 Studebaker. If you are removing the front fenders or the complete front end sheet metal assembly (called the front clip) and then when putting it back together if you don't get the shims back in the exact same location as they were when it came from the factory you may have a problem. The results can be frustrating because the doors may not align with the fenders or actually may crunch the sheet metal or scratch that new paint job.

Here is what you should do when taking body parts apart. Pay close attention to how many and the exact location you find each shim(s). Make a drawing with complete notes of which shims came from which location. It helps to put a number on each shim and note the number on the drawing so they all get placed where they were and then things should line up as they were. If using new shims make sure to use the same size and number of shims you found when taking it apart.

#### **ASLEEP AT THE WHEEL?**

t was still dark on a Friday morning in November when a California Highway Patrol officer started following a Tesla Model S on Route 101 between the San Francisco International Airport and Palo Alto. The gray sedan was going 70 miles per hour with a turn signal blinking, cruising past multiple exits. The officer pulled up alongside and saw the driver in a head-slumped posture. Lights and sirens failed to rouse him. The car, the officer guessed, was driving itself under the control of what Tesla calls Autopilot.

Every Tesla is equipped with hardware that the automaker says will enable its vehicles to be capable of driving themselves on entire trips, from parking space to parking space, with no input from the driver. At the moment, the company limits its cars to a system that can guide them from on-ramp to off-ramp on highways. The system is smart enough, it seems, to keep the Tesla driving safely even with a seemingly incapacitated driver, but not yet smart enough to obey police sirens and pull over.

This case appears to be the first time law enforcement has stopped a vehicle on an open road under the control of an automated system. There was no way for police to commandeer the driving software, so they improvised a way to manipulate Tesla's safety programming. A highway patrol car blocked traffic from behind while the officer following the Tesla pulled in front and began to slow down until both cars came to a stop.

## **BUYING A GREAT ANTIQUE STUDEBAKER**

It seems like we all go through a Studebaker progression when we become enamored by this brand and its many years and models of human transportation. Well, it happened to me as well. When I was a senior in high school a group of us guys became obsessed with the beautiful lines and overall appearance of the 1953 Studebaker Commander coupes and hard-tops. So we formed a car club on the west side of Phoenix. Like most young males who liked cars, we wanted a name that would tell the world about who we are. Since we liked Studebaker and all wanted to own that model together the obvious testosterone driven name would be THE STUDS!! So became the name of our group. I asked my dad for a loan of \$350 to purchase a hardtop from a car lot on east Van Buren. Dad said no, so I just had to ride with the other studs. I never lost my desire for that model. This happened in 1958.

In 2003, I began to seriously look for that hard-to-find model. While searching on eBay I found a 1962 GT Hawk for sale that was located in Show Low, Arizona. You can probably guess who was selling it. I was the high bidder and bought the car from Malcolm Stinson. Malcolm and I became good friends. We negotiated a working agreement for restoring the car. It worked fine and I ended up with a pretty red car that would win awards when judged. This car hooked both Sandie and me into the Studebaker fold. We surprisingly sold this car in October 19, 2018.

After becoming a full-fledged Studebaker fan I was led into the Antique Studebaker Club by Malcolm Stinson when he formed the Arizona chapter. That led to my purchase of a real nice 1941 Commander. I mentioned earlier that



most of us go through a progression with Studebakers. I now owned two and had also purchased and sold a 1964 Daytona Convertible. I still own a 1952 Deuce and a Half Studebaker Army truck that is almost free and available. So as our flock was growing as we have been aging, we made the decision that we wanted to reduce our inventory to just one good Studebaker-road-worthy-driver.

I mentioned that the Hawk was sold, so we now had the funds for the car that very well could be our last toy. In August 2018 I began looking for a great 1934 Studebaker rod built to travel and

be enjoyed. During the search I remembered our friends Chester and Nancy Bradfield. I thought that they may know someone who had what I was looking for. Chester made a couple of suggestions that did not work out. Later we talked again. He mentioned that Nancy had this real nice rod that she might sell, but she was on a cruise and he would have to ask her if it was available. I received a call that was indeed available. They invited Sandie and me to come to the Shenandoah Valley to their place in Bridgewater, Virginia and be their guests. On December 4 we flew to Charlotte, North Carolina and drove to their beautiful home. We saw their fantastic collection of cars. Being exceptional hosts, they toured us about their county showing us the lifestyle and history of the area.

By the end of the second day we bought the car. The car was delivered to our doorstep by December 19, exactly two months after the sale of the GT Hawk. By the way, the main reason I was looking for a 1934 was very strange. Before I met Sandie in 1963, I was at the Greyhound Park flea market in 1962 and found an almost perfect set of 1934 all-copper Arizona license plates. I purchased them for \$5.00 total. We have carried those plates to Illinois, Texas, and now back to Arizona. They have been officially Arizona titled and registered to our 'new' car. Life changes all of us. After some thinking I have realized that most of my best friends today are all Studebaker people. Yes, Ed Smith, I believe that Studebaker people make the best friends.

Oh yes, for those who like details, the car is a 1934 4-door Commander, 350-Chevy and 3-speed automatic transmission, Vintage air conditioning, tilt steering wheel, electric seats, Mustang II front suspension and Chevy Tahoe hardtop roof.
