From the Editor's Pen.....


n important piece of Studebaker history goes on the Aauction block in August and the Studebaker National Museum is interested in procuring it for its collection. This item is one of the five Studebaker Indy cars and was raced in 1931, 1932 and 1933. Richard Quinn wrote briefly about the history of the car to be auctioned: "Car #37 (the Valpey car) was owned by Ab Jenkins but considered part of the team. It ran as an independent in '31 as the Hunt Jenkins Special. It was driven by Tony Gulotta and was ahead of every other car on the track with only 33 laps to go but was wrecked as victory seemed almost assured. It won the Pike's Peak Hill Climb also in 1931 (driven by Chuck Myers) and set a new record in the unlimited class.

In 1932, still numbered #37 it was driven by Zeke Myer to a 6th place finish. In 1933 Studebaker used new aerodynamic bodies on its four cars but the Jenkins car (now #47) got a new radiator shell but used the old '32 body. It was driven by L. L. "Slim" Corum to a 12th pace finish."

On page 8 is a letter written by Don Jones, SDC vice president, about the museum's quest to acquire the car and how you can help make it happen with a pledge. The SDC has made a pledge and you too can help with a pledge. You would pay the pledged amount only if the Museum's bid is accepted.

Summer time = Construction time!

ot that there isn't construction year-round here in the Valley of The Sun, summer time is more often the best times for road construction, especially in the outskirts and other states. Please slow in work zone and remember that everyone wants to get to their destination whether it be vaca-

tion or simply home after a day of work. Below are a few tips for your summer travel through construction zones, whether it be in a Studebaker or another vehicle. Stay safe out there.

If you come across a construction zone this summer, it is important to remember these basic safety tips:

· Pay attention to and follow all directions on posted signage. · Stay calm and focus on the driving . Turn on your headlights to increase your visibility · Drive the recommended speed limit or slower and do not resume normal speed until posted sign instructs you to . Keep a safe stopping distance between you and the driver in front of you -Never pass on the shoulder or the median · Stay patient through delays · Be aware of where construction workers are working · Be aware of machinery and equipment.

It is also good to know how construction zones are laid out, so that when you are approaching one you know what to expect:

-Advanced Warning Area: This is the area before coming up to a construction zone. Usually there will be posted signage telling you when the construction begins, the length of delays, and where the construction ends.


-Transition Area: This is the area right before a construction zone where you will reduce your speed or merge lanes.

-Buffer Area: This is the buffer space between the transition area and where the workers are to give drivers time to correct their actions.

-Work Area: This is the area where the actual construction is happening.

-Termination Area: This is the area between the end of the construction zone and where drivers can resume normal activitv.

"Rhodium 45" By Richard Dormois

At about noon on June 15th, seventeen members drove to Rhodium 45 at 45 West Southern Avenue, Mesa where founder Larry Read had invited our club to his "Vehicle Storage and Lounge". Mr. Read entertained us with a brief history of this entity and his history in several lubrication ventures in North and South America. He mentioned that in 2017 his companies, "Oil Changers" and "North American Lubricants", serviced fifteen million vehicles.

Mr. Read described the five cars displayed in the main salon. The 1931 Hudson President was built for and driven by President Herbert Hoover, served time in Panama and in the Bill Harrah Museum in Reno, Nevada. Larry purchased it in the recent Hostetler dispersion in Indiana and said to be valued at eight hundred thousand dollars. The 1934 Hudson Terraplane dedicated to Aviatrix Amelia Earhart is valued at five hundred thousand dollars according to Mr. Read. The butter cream 1936 Ford Roadster in Pebble Beach Concours condition seems to be perfect in every way and valued at seventy five thousand dollars. The iconic Pepto Bismol pink 1959 Cadillac deVille Convertible has been in a plethora of displays and parades in California and Arizona and was featured in the Clint Eastwood film "Pink Cadillac" filmed in the gaming industry in Nevada. I too had the pleasure of working with Mr. Eastwood on that film in Sparks, Nevada. The 1939 Buick Business Coupe, 1940 and 1941 Ford pick up trucks find duty in "The Great Race" Mr. Read had been involved in for decades and the '41 Ford is competing as I compose this article.

Important Museum Announcement on the 1931 Studebaker Indy Car

Yesterday the Studebaker National Museum Board of Trustees at their monthly meeting made the decision to pursue acquisition of the 1931 Studebaker Indy Car. This car, as you know, is being sold at the Gooding Auction being held in Monterey, Calif. on August 16-17. 2019. You can read much of the history of this car on this thread: https:// forum.studebakerdriversclub.com/showthread.php?111494-Studebaker-Indy-car-37-to-be-auctioned-Aug-16-17.

This is probably the most important Studebaker vehicle sold in this country in the past 50 years and is expected to be one of the highlights of this Gooding sale. The sale of this vehicle will no doubt set the record for the highest price of a Studebaker ever sold. With this said, the Board of Trustees, pledged and committed a significant amount of funds for this purchase. However, they do not believe that at this time they have accumulated enough to actually purchase this car.

There is a RESERVE on the car which is unknown and that is part of the problem along with the fact that many of these type vehicles are being purchased by overseas buyers and also that none of the other Studebaker Indy cars are available for purchase on the open market. To my knowledge this is the first time one of these cars has crossed the auction block.

The Museum Board has asked me to post this to the Forum where many SDC members, friends of Studebakers and others can see it, and ask for your help in bringing this car home to South Bend. I have made a significant pledge to assist in the Museum's efforts to acquire this car. Now I am asking you to join me, the members of the Board of Trustees and friends of the Museum to help us bring this car back to South Bend. TECHNICAL INFORMATION Door Jamb Courtesy Light Switches by Jerry Blount

D oor jam switch #285641 has been used on Studebaker cars from 1942 thru 1966 and on trucks from 1949 thru 1964. (Only exception is Avanti which uses #1351043.) The correct replacement switch is no longer available new but Studebaker parts sources are supplying a similar universal switch which fits and works just fine, but looks somewhat different. For a daily driver this replacement switch would never be an issue but one of my customers is doing a full restoration on a 1955 Speedster. This car would demand the correct appearing door jam switch.



The switch is not complex and only provides a ground function to complete the dome light circuit. Typically, disassembling, cleaning and light lubrication is all it takes to make these switches work. They seem to be common enough to find used, so if yours is damaged find another used one. Even though the Studebaker part number never changed, there are two different styles of faceplate shapes used. One, which seems to be the earlier ones, had a basic oval shape. The ones which seem to be the later examples have rounded sides but a somewhat straight top and bottom.



They are totally interchangeable but at least you would like to match the other switches on your car. They are simple to take apart: just bend the tab that hold it together and remove the internal components. Clean the plunger, spring and contacts as needed, lightly lubricate and reassemble.

Avanti switches are unique in that they can't ground to the body so they have a separate ground wire connection to complete the circuit. The Studebaker aftermarket does supply a switch that has a terminal that attaches to the switch mounting location to thus ground the switch body. Not quite the original but it works. (Later Avanti II models did use this very aftermarket door jamb switch with a small notch filed in the switch mounting opening that allowed

the wire terminal to fit under the switch mounting screw.)

A MINI-CHERNOBYL, MAYBE



When someone mentions nuclear reactor, you should at least think of Palo Verde, 60 miles west of Phoenix, or the aircraft carriers and submarines in the U.S. arsenal. In 1958, the Ford Motor Company was thinking of a nuclear powered automobile, the Nucleon.

In 1958 there was no War on Terrorism when nuclear power appeared to be the answer to all of our country's energy needs. The Nucleon was going to tap into this very popular

scientific optimism and make it readily available to the driving public. As can be seen by the drawing, the Nucleon is a very futuristic concept of a cross between the Ranchero and Econoline van. With one exception, the riding area was located far forward of the front axle, maximizing the distance from the radioactive core located at the rear.

The Ford engineers envisioned Nucleon recharging stations similar to today's electric recharging stations frequented by Teslas. Similar to the process at the Palo Verde Nuclear Generating Station, the decay of the radioactive core in the Nucleon would create heat that would turn water into steam that would power two turbines, one to propel the Nucleon and the other to generate electric power. A cooling



loop returned steam to reusable water. Airflow accessed through vents in the roof of the riding compartment cooled the steam as well as the occupants. Recharging (refueling the core) would be required about every 5,000 miles.

Ford never produced a working prototype of the Nucleon even though it was received with great enthusiasm. Under today's political climate and the sheer number of vehicles on the road, the potential for terrorist acts and serious nuclear accidents would prevent their popularity. And, that is not saying anything about the lack of availability of a small reactor for use in the Nucleon.

So what does the Nucleon have to do with Studebaker? Nothing, other than the fact that Studebaker was "Always ahead of Its Time" in developing new automotive technology and could easily have proposed the Nucleon as a Studebaker project. However, in the late 50s Studebaker was barely keeping its head in the game, searching for a product line in and out of auto manufacturing that would put the corporation in the black. Pushing reality aside, it is always fun to think about what might have been - a prototype Nucleon vehicle decaying in the Studebaker Test Track graveyard waiting for discovery and restoration, followed by display in the Studebaker National Museum. You know, it could have been!!

Footnote:

B ecause I was employed by the Arizona Radiation Regulatory Agency for 33 years, I know the science of reactor safety pretty well. There are a couple of situations not discussed in the two references. A LOCA is a loss of coolant accident. This type of situation can be very serious and lead to a core melt-down. This is also true if the neutron absorbing boron rods can not be lowered into the core to lower reactivity. Lastly, a Chernobyl style disaster is not possible because all reactors in America must be constructed with a containment barrier in accordance with a NRC license. However, the containment could be melted through creating a contamination disaster on a public highway.
