

want to take this opportunity to thank the Board and all the Members of our Chapter of the SDC for the special gift that was given recently to our foundation. The special gift of \$50 was made to WSG Foundation in memory of Bonnie. Bonnie passed away in June after having cancer for 25 years. Normally this special gift would have been made to the SDC Foundation in memory of a member who passed away. This time it was made to the WSG Foundation which is a 501c3 designated foundation by the IRS.

Bonnie and I have been working on making the WSG Foundation a functioning reality for the last year or so. In February this year it all came together. The purpose of the WSG is to provide grant funds to help cover the cost of education for people that want to attend either college or a trade school. Our emphasis is on trade schools. Our first grantee will be starting at a technical school to become a respiratory therapist capable of working in a hospital setting. There are no limitations on the trade as long as it requires some formal education. It could be automotive related or construction trades or . . . there are so many possibilities.

We have done this because Bonnie and I believe that our society needs more trained trades people. Not everyone requires a four year college degree to make a good living and be a productive member of our society. So we have initially funded the WSG Foundation . Eventually we expect that it will be self-sustaining as funds are donated to it and as grants are provided.

U.S. Senate Committee Passes Bill to Commemorate Route 66 Centennial By SEMA Washington, D.C., Staff

The U.S. Senate Environment and Public Works Committee passed legislation to create a commission that would recommend ways to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Route 66, which was commissioned in 1926 as the first all-paved U.S. highway. The "Route 66 Centennial Commission Act," S. 1014, creates a 15-person commission with representatives appointed by the President of the United States, Secretary of the U.S. Department of Transportation, Speaker of the U.S. House, President of the U.S. Senate, and Governors of Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California.

The bill provides the commission with five years to make recommendations to the President and Congress, outlining financial and administrative responsibilities for celebrating the 100th anniversary. The commission may recommend the production of various written materials, films and documentaries, education programs, artistic works, commemorative memorabilia and celebrations to commemorate Route 66's storied history.

The bipartisan bill now awaits action on the U.S. Senate floor. A similar version of the bill, H.R. 66, passed the U.S. House of Representatives earlier this year by a margin of 393 to 22.

The Mayback brand too was seen up close by many for the first time.

COURTING MADE EASIER AND MORE

n the 1946 movie "It's a Wonderful Life", Jimmy Stewart courted Donna Reed at her character's parents' home, of course in the parlor, listening to "Buffalo Gals" on the phonograph. This scenario was not conducive to an active lovelife and could be dangerous to a visitor if the actions taken did not meet the approval of the girl's mother. During the first half of the 20th Century the development of the automobile greatly changed how young couples conducted their courting activities.

As noted in the development of the Studebaker, there was considerable carryover in design trends from buggies to the first automobiles manufactured. You rode up high on very rough roads with little to no protection from the ele-

ments. By the late teens a few closed cars were starting to appear. But it was the development of the rumble seat that permitted a young couple to pursue more engaging romantic activities away from the steering wheel or go double dating with friends who wanted to share the evening in snugglepupping at the local "lovers lane". By the mid-20s, according to historian David Lewis, some couples even found ways to engage in romance on the large running boards and long sloping front fenders, of course with the aid of pillows and blankets to make these areas more accommodating.

In the Roaring 20s the closed car continued to gain more of the market-share. This type of arrangement permitted a young couple to carry the comfort of home to the submarine races down by the local lake. In 1922 Hudson introduced the Essex, at \$1495; it was the lowest priced closed



automobile manufactured in America. By 1929 ninety percent of the cars made were now closed. In 1927 Studebaker marketed the all-new Erskine with a rumble seat for your driving and social pleasure. The popularity of the rumble seat continued until the last holdout disappeared in 1939.

> In the 1930s the big news was that a radio was an option in most cars. You could take your sweetie out parking and listen to the hits of Irving Berlin and Cole Porter while watching the stars from above twinkle in your girl's eyes.

> Automatic transmissions were on the horizon so it was up to you to find something that would allow you to sit close to your date on the way to the evening's festivities. A "necking knob" was the answer. Mounted on the steering wheel, it permitted the driver to participate in lovemaking while steering the car down the road with one hand on the knob. Your parents were told the knob was necessary because of the added safety while shifting gears.

> Most first dates start with an agreed upon activity. In the good-old-days, your ride would take you to Bob's Big Boy, Sonic or A&W Restaurants. There you would get a bite to eat and hopefully visit with friends doing their thing. This was followed by a trip to the drive-in movies, which, before the night was over, turned into the "passion pit" where the show in the back seat was better than the show on the screen. I can still remember my first experience at the passion pit; sadly, it was not in a Studebaker.
