

LAST DOWN FOR A LEGEND

Article reprinted from March, 2021 Aviation History

t 9:15 am on March 31, 1931, Transcontinental and Western Air Flight 599 took off from Kansas City, Mo., bound for Wichita, Kan. About 75 minutes into the flight, the Fokker F-10 trimotor's right wing detached, causing the air-

plane to crash in a field near the small Kansas town of Bazaar. All eight people on board were killed. Among them was one of America's biggest celebrities of the day, Notre Dame football coach Knute Rockne.

Born in Norway, Rockne became Notre Dame's coach in 1918. Over the next 13 seasons he lead the "Fighting Irish" to a stellar 105-12-5 record and three national championships. Names forever associated with Notre Dame teams of the era include Rockne, George Gipp ("win one for the gipper" fame) and the undefeated 1924 team's backfield, dubbed the Four Horsemen.

The search for the accident's cause was hamstrung by the fact that by the time investigators arrived at the scene, souvenir hunters had stripped the wrecked Fokker clean, leaving on the wings, propellers and engines. While a definitive explanation for the crash has never been established, it soon became clear that seeping moisture had compromised the F-10's wooden frame, causing the glue that fixed the wing to the fuselage to fail. Ice and turbulence may well



that fixed the wing to the fuselage to fail. Ice and turbulence may well have added fatal stress to the wing spar and contributed to the accident.

Rockne's success had made him one of the country's most recognized names, and his death at age 43 struck a nerve with the public. President Herbert Hoover sent a condolence telegram to Rockne's wife declaring, "Every American grieves with you." The accident shook the public's confidence in the embryonic air industry, in particular wooden airplanes. One immediate outcome of the crash was the quick adaption of all-metal aircraft, which were more expensive but perceived as safer. Additionally, the outcry over Rockne's death forced investigators to go public with their findings, reversing the Department of Commerce's established practice of keeping the results of accident investigations secret. That new transparency, along with added regulations for airplane manufacturers and airlines, eventually resulted in a safer aviation industry.

A thought came to me upon reading *The Echo* February, 2021 cover story on the first Studebaker shop. I had to do some searching through photo albums to find this picture of the monument.



This monument sat along US 250 east of Ashland Ohio, not far out of the city limits and about 20 miles from the site of the 2019 SDC International Meet in Mansfield Ohio.

The text on the monument reads: "On this site in 1835 John Studebaker erected his home and shop with this legend over the door, 'Owe no man anything but love one another.' Here were born three of his sons who later founded the Studebaker institution in South Bend, Indiana"

As a disclaimer, this photo was shot in 1982 so I can't verify that it's still there.

Studebaker Shop Belt Buckle

This belt buckle came about by a suggestion by Chuck Naugle in the spring of 1988. He brought up the idea of using the image of the first Studebaker blacksmith

shop, which at the time was published in *Turning Wheels* for one of the featured columns. The money was to be used to provide funds for the chapter and for the upcoming International Meet held in South Bend later that year. The



idea was brought up at a membership meeting held at a bank at Swan and Sunrise.

Initially the chapter was somewhat hesitant to approve the motion. It was to be a limited edition to 300 belt buckles. There was a concern that 300 belt buckles seemed to be a high number to be sold, but the motion was approved. Chuck had contacted Hoover's Manufacture Company in Peru, Illinois to stamp and number the 300 belt buckles. The chapter membership had first choice to get a number for their personal belt buckle.

The buckles were advertised as limited edition to the 300 to be made. Several buckles went to Australia with Lloyd Watts coordinating that effort. To everyone's surprise, the belt buckles were a great hit and sold out quickly. The motion was made to manufacture more buckles, and was not passed.

Later, the buckle was made again, but without the number stamped on the back. So, if you have a numbered buckle, that is one of the originals.



NEVER IGNORE THE SUGGESTION OF A WOMAN

This article is a follow up to my courting article last year because courting and music go hand-in-hand. The story begins in 1929 when there were no radios in cars. Two gentlemen, William Lear and Elmer Wavering, drove their girl-friends out to a local overlook to watch the sunset and do what young couples do in a romantic setting. While enjoying the sunset one of the girls suggested the sunset would be nicer with a little music. So the two men began their quest to develop a radio for use in a car. Their research led them to a Chicago radio convention where they met Paul Galvin who put them to work at his factory developing their car radio. (Note: Philco began marketing a car radio in 1930.)

Who would guess the first radio tested in a car was tested in Galvin's Studebaker (another first for Studebaker). He was so excited by their success that he drove the Studebaker 300 miles to a radio convention in Atlanta. Once there he could not afford to display the Studebaker in the convention hall, so he parked the car out front and blasted the radio so the passing conventioneers could hear the music. He received many orders for the nameless car radio. Because it was common to use the suffix "ola" to name phonograph and radio products of the day, i.e. Victrola, he decided to name the car radio the Motorola.

As with other businesses of the day, the Depression hit his car radio business very hard until the mid 30s when Ford began to offer the Motorola in new Fords and B.F. Goodrich began selling them in its tire stores. Galvin Manufac-

turing continued to improve his product line by introducing the first push button radio, police scanner radio and the first two-way radio used by the Army in WWII. In 1947 the company name was changed from Galvin Manufacturing to Motorola. Galvin's company should also be noted for developing the following: the first television to sell for less than \$200, the first pager, the equipment used for televising the first step on the moon in 1969 and the first handheld cellular phone. Where would the youth of America be without this innovation?

Wavering and Lear, the two men who started this odyssey went on to have illustrious careers. Wavering continued to work for Motorola and developed the first automotive alternator. Lear had more than 150 inventions credited to his name, including the eight track tape player that was so popular in the cars of the late 60s, and more importantly his inventions associated with aviation: the radio direction finder, autopilot, automatic landing system, and his most famous invention, the Lear Jet, the first mass produced business jet.



Yes, Studebaker played a small part in the development of the car radio, but it is more important to remember that nothing would have happened without that first suggestion made by a woman.

By the mid-50s all cars could be purchased with a radio. In some cases the radio could automatically seek out your favorite station with a push of a button. Iconic industrial designer Raymond Loewy, who designed cars for Studebaker, called the automobile of the day a "jukebox on wheels". The car had evolved from a simple means of transportation not unlike the horse, to an entertainment center for the young-at-heart.
