THE WAGONAIRE



n 1963 designer Brooks Stevens brought out, at the beginning of the year, a n 1963 designer Brooks Stevens prought out, at the search of and was style that was called the "Wagonaire." This vehicle had a sliding roof and was available in Standard, Regal and Daytona trim. Prices ranged from the 6cylinder Standard at \$2,430 to a 6-cylinder Daytona for \$2,700. As an 8 cylinder Standard, the price was \$2,565, and the top wagon and most expensive Lark that Studebaker offered was the Daytona V-8 wagon selling for \$2.835 (by 1966 the Daytona Wagonaire was selling for \$2,695.).

The vehicle was a must for those wishing to transport tall objects such as trees, bushes and high furniture. At first it sold well, until many owners found out that it didn't fare well in inclement weather...it LEAKED! As a result, production halted early in the year, as necessary alterations were made. To keep the wagon trade rolling, a stationary-roof models was again reintroduced for \$100 less than the Wagonaire.

But the cost of re-tooling at mid-season for this novel wagon was prohibitive, and Studebaker chose to limp along...with a leaking Wagonaire, hoping that its owners would be willing to allow for some corrections when they were devised. Rust also proved to be a major factor in the edges of the roof of these vehicles, but this devastating malady did not show up in the first year. Excerpted from Studebaker Cars by James Moloney.

C everal emagazines come into our inboxes each day O including a few that are automotive related. Earlier this month a headline in one called The Shop, an emag for automotive professionals, announced "Goodyear to Source Rubber from Dandelions". That really caught my eye. I read in the article Goodyear Tire has formed a multi-year, multi-dollar program supported by the Department of Defense to develop a domestic source of natural rubber from a specific species of dandelion. While rubber trees take seven years to produce the latex needed for rubber production, dandelions can be harvested every six months. Though latex from rubber trees is sourced from tropical locations, dandelions can be produced domestically - helping to mitigate future supply chain challenges. The natural rubber produced from dandelions will be used in the production of military aircraft tires built and tested with the Air Force in Dayton, Ohio.



Keep America Beautiful, Drive a Studebaker!



Letter to the Editor:

read the article in the *Echo* about the postal zip vans and it brought back personal memories of the vans.

In April, 1968, I was hired by the postal service as a letter carrier at the Federal station in downtown Milwaukee. Part of my initial training involved learning to drive a zip van. Not fun! First I had to learn to drive a right hand drive vehicle and then to drive it standing up. What? I found that standing up while driving put your weight balance on your left foot and leg so your right foot can stay on the gas or brake pedal. The author of that article failed to mention the brake pedal was also on the floor and nearly impossible to stay in that position while turning a corner and maintaining control. I was resigned to drive it for afternoon collections. Remember the neighborhood mail boxes to put your letter in?

No one wanted to drive it and after a few months it was assigned to another station.

The zip vans were originally designed for rural



delivery or in subdivisions where the mailbox is next to the street or road, not in downtown Milwaukee! The ones in use today are descendants of the zip.

s the batteries age, they build up sulphates which weaken them and makes starting more difficult. Not only does the

engine turn over more slowly but there is less energy at the coil, resulting in a weaker spark. This can make starting difficult for a hot or cold engine. Battery cable size matters. The thinner 12- volt cables cannot transfer the amperage required by a six-volt starter. Use '00' size cables. They can be ordered from most parts stores. If your cables are'00' size, you may still be robbing your starter of power if you have replaced the original battery clamp with a generic clamp-type connector. There just isn't enough contact with the cable to carry the full amperage. Replace the ends with proper clamps. Local auto electric or electric motor repair shops should be able to do this for you. The solder type ends are available from local auto parts stores.

Studebaker, as well as all manufacturers, built six- volt car electrical systems for years and they started in all conditions. Eight- volt batteries are available, but if the system is working properly, then a 6 volt will be fine.

All of the usuals still apply. Keep terminals clean (check them at the start of each driving season). Keep the water topped up with distilled water (only to the specified level). Fully charge before storage and store batteries in a cool, dry location when they are out of the car. It is okay to leave it in the car, just charge it up and disconnect one of the cables. This is especially important if the wiring on the collector car is in guestionable condition. Many collector cars have been lost through electrical fires. Also, by removing one of the cables, it stops the electrolysis process that is continually present when the both cables are connected. As a point of interest, the older and dirtier that the engine coolant is, the greater amount the electrolysis will be going through the cooling system. The electrolysis process attacks rubber and metal. It may be slow but it is continual as long as the battery cables are connected and there is power in the battery.

Did you know?

he fabulous 1950-51 bullet-nose Studebakers were probably the most famous Studebaker design of all time and arguably the one most well-remembered by the general public. For 1950 Studebaker built 343,164 of them (its best year), with another 268,565 for 1951. Studebaker advertised the bullet-nose as the "Next Look" for 1950 and it was different indeed from everything else on the road. All of the 1950 models were powered by in-line 6 cylinder engines with the Champions having the smaller Champion six and the Commanders and Land Cruisers having the larger Commander six.



Then and now, bullet-nose Studebakers were seen everywhere. Fozzie Bear drove one in "The Muppet Movie". Avon produced a men's cologne bottle in the image of one. The Studebaker's Night Club featured one on its menus and matchbooks. And considering that Studebaker only built a total of maybe 4.5 million cars in its entire 64 years of automobile manufacturing, roughly 1 out of 8 Studebakers ever built were bullet-nose models. Millions of people rode in one at one time or another.

RICHES TO RAGS

One 1936 Studebaker President magazine ad stated: "Styled Throughout by Gifted Helen Dryden". In her day she was the best, however, her story is somewhat sad and thought provoking as to how her career ended so abruptly.

Helen Dryden was born on November 26, 1882 to a wealthy Baltimore family. Her future as a socialite in a prominent family was cut short with the failure of the family business. Soon after the business failed the family moved to Pennsylvania where she attended the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts to study landscape art. She soon found her real interest was 18th Century French design and dress. Sometime in 1908 she moved to New York City to show her fashion portfolio to the publishing industry. After numerous rejections she was hired by *Vogue* Magazine where she flourished until 1923. It was at this time she became a trendsetter for the social elite while becoming the highest paid female artist in America. Her first encounter with Raymond Loewy, who was also a fashion illustrator, was also at this time. It is worth noting that she was cultivating a second career as a Broadway costume designer.

By 1929 her influence on automotive design is documented in *Automobile Topics*, a weekly automotive news magazine. In 1930 she appeared with several celebrities in a Studebaker ad that stated, "styled as befit champions by those whose word in art carries authority". (Author's note: There's that name "Champion" that Studebaker would name their last all new car in 1939).



In 1935, in an article about the New York Auto Show in the *New York Times*, Ms. Dryden is listed as an industrial design and style expert. The following year she and Raymond Loewy were contracted as design consultants by Studebaker. Her salary at this time was reported to be \$100,000. This relationship continued through the 1938 Model year, in which the Studebaker line was reported as the most beautiful car manufactured by the *Magazine of Art*.

By 1940 Helen Dryden's art deco style was no longer fashionable and with the pending war, she was no longer




in the limelight. Her future was beginning to change at age 58. She was now on welfare and would be until her death in 1972. Although a sad ending, she should be remembered for her contributions: in the art world for her fashion designs; three of the most beautiful Studebakers ever manufactured that bore the red lazy "S" emblem that she created; and most of all that women could function in a man's automotive world. She also realized that women were important automobile consumers and that cars should be attractive to this segment of the buying public. Justifiably so, her work was the foundation of things to come as exemplified in the 2018 book *Damsels of Design*, about the ladies who designed auto interiors for GM during the Golden Age of Automobiles.


